
While teaching and learning is our core business, there is also a strong focus on student well-being. To enable our students to be the best they can be, it is important that development of the whole person occurs. This translates to ensuring that students possess qualities such as resilience, commitment, respect, confidence and empathy.

As term one concludes, perhaps the quality which has been most tested in the past two weeks has been resilience. Not all students have been able to bounce back from a disappointing result in an assignment or test, with a resolution to learn from their mistakes and do better next time. It is better to have tried and failed, than not to have tried at all for fear of failure. Sometimes it is necessary for students to make changes to their habits in order to experience greater success, both in academic and non-academic pursuits.

The anti-bullying programme which was held on 16 March, was designed to foster positive relationships among students, and to build resilience when others say unkind words or engage in inappropriate behaviour on social media. I commend the efforts of our Pastoral Leaders in bringing the issue of bullying out in the open with a strong message that it is not tolerated. By providing students with tips on what to do if they are bullied, it is hoped that they are more willing to report this unacceptable behaviour.

Over the past few weeks, many of our students have been selected in sporting teams at a district or regional level. Part of the process of selection requires a commitment to having the paperwork completed and attending training. There have been too many occasions when the managers of these teams have contacted the college for permission, as some students have not followed the required procedures. Selection in these teams is a privilege, where a commitment to attend training is paramount. Not only is the credibility of the college in question, if students do not present for training, but students who are not prepared to commit are setting themselves up for disappointment later in life, when this quality is very important in both one's professional and personal life. Congratulations to the two current students (Nadia Falvo and Tyler Ius) and one former student (Callum McCarthy) who proudly carried the Queen's Baton as a prelude to the Commonwealth Games. They demonstrated pride, confidence and commitment. When one enrols at St Stephen's, there is a commitment to abide by our policies, procedures, expectations and culture. The practice of this college is to finish for the term on Thursday 29 March, at 3.00 pm. I ask that parents respect this expectation by ensuring that students do not leave school before this date or time.

Last Friday, I had the rewarding experience of listening to some of the year twelve students' soliloquies on their Shakespearean play, Hamlet. Confidence, creativity and eloquent speeches abounded, as they delivered their presentations. They have demonstrated resilience over the past few weeks to meet assessment deadlines and to still have the internal fortitude to give of their best in a dramatic performance. This quality was further demonstrated by David Bin at the Lions Youth of the Year judging in Townsville, where he was declared the overall winner.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It is not often appreciated that teachers also have families, experience medical challenges or are entitled to long service leave to rejuvenate. In term two, there will be some minor changes to timetables to cater for these situations. We welcome back Mrs Leah Heath who will be covering some classes for the remainder of the year. As always, your child's well-being is at the foremost of all that we do. Therefore, much thought has been devoted to ensuring that the transition is as smooth as possible.

In our secular society, Easter is associated with the giving of Easter eggs and an opportunity to go camping with one's family. As part of our Catholic identity, we are holding a special Easter liturgy on Thursday 29 March to mark the significance of Easter for those of the Christian faith. I leave you with the following Easter message from the Gospel of John:

"I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in me shall never die." (John 11: 25-26)

On behalf of the college staff, I thank all parents for their support in term one and wish you all a holy Easter and a relaxing break with your children. (School resumes on Tuesday 17 April, as Monday is a student free day for staff professional learning.)

Pastoral Challenge – Take a stand!

Do You Know John the Baptist? John the Baptist. Who was this guy?

Do you know someone who stands up for people who are being put down? How about someone who tells friends it's crazy to use alcohol and drugs? What about someone who takes a stand on political issues, arguing for peace or pro-life values? Do you know a person who won't laugh at racist jokes?

If you know any of those people, you know John the Baptist. He had the guts to publicly challenge people to follow God's way – a path of compassion, forgiveness, repentance and sacrifice for poor people. He called on ordinary people and the rulers of his day to change their lives. He pointed to Jesus as the example to follow. In the end his courage cost him his life.

Pastoral Challenge - What action are we called to take?

It's tough speaking the truth. I know people who take a stand for what they see as injustice, because they read the Gospel and they are challenged to do life Jesus' way. They have guts. Look around. Other people in our world, probably at your school, work place, or in your local community are showing similar courage. Doesn't our broken world need more people who are willing to stand for God, even when it costs them? How can I be more like John the Baptist at school, at work, at home, or in our local community?

Hello from e-Learning!

As we approach the end of term one, it is instructive to reflect on the success of the one to one roll-out for students of years seven and ten. The programme has met with continued success, with very few issues (single digit percent). I am particularly gratified that students continue to look after the device and accessories, helping to contribute to a positive initiative.



I would ask parents to remind their students that devices are to be charged overnight so that they can have a full day of usage in school; getting into good habits early is the key to success. I also ask that if students have a problem with the device, they are to report to the library and submit a ticket so that the problem can be rectified. We have a small retinue of spare devices that are used as loans should any problems occur, which means that students spend no more than five minutes without a computer and can continue to get on with their learning.

I am so excited about the future of technology at St Stephen's and cannot wait to share some technology initiatives with you in the near future.





SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS NOW OPEN!


Scholarship applications for academic, sporting and cultural for Year 7 in 2019, are now available. Application forms are available from the college website or from the college office.

Closing date: Thursday 29 March 2018

Families intending to enrol students for 2019 must collect an enrolment package from the college or download a copy from our website. The following steps outline the process:

1. Complete the application for enrolment documentation.
2. Attach the necessary documentation as per the checklist in the enrolment package.
3. Return the application with \$100.00 enrolment fee in person or by mail and all applications must be received by 29 March 2018.
4. Once the enrolment application has been received, you will be contacted for an interview. Your enrolment interview may occur in terms one or two.
5. Confirmation of your child's enrolment will occur in term two, when you will be sent a confirmation of enrolment package to complete. This package must be returned to the college for processing.
