FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of St Stephen's

"Tell me and I forget. Teach me and I remember. Involve me and I learn." (Benjamin Franklin)

Welcome back to term three. I hope you were able to enjoy quality time with your children during the mid-year break.

At the college's first assembly for term three, students were encouraged to develop their natural talents, abilities and intelligence through effort, persistence, practice and focused attention. Before students commenced their holidays at the end of term two, I had the privilege of reading their reports. It was clearly apparent that many students had worked very hard to develop their talents. This was demonstrated in the excellent work ethic comments they received for the majority of their subjects.

As teachers and parents we need to help our students to understand the growth mindset. Being "smart" is not something one is; it is something one acquires through persistence and the manner in which challenges are tackled. Over the past three State of Origins games, we all marvelled at the talent of Jonathan Thurston. However, he had to learn to catch the football the same way as everyone else does. What is different for Thurston, is that he developed his God-given talent through practice, persistence and focused attention. To foster a growth mindset, it is necessary to praise students for their efforts, perseverance and the approach they take to overcoming challenges that arise. In so doing, the process of learning is encouraged.

Not only are students often challenged, but our staff worked very hard at the end of last term and the beginning of this term to relocate to a refurbished staff room and student services area. I apologise to parents for the inconvenience of trekking to the Drama room to the temporary reception area, while renovations were in progress. We are looking forward to providing a more efficient service with the completion of our latest building project which should take place by the end of August. The process has brought home to us the comforts we take for granted which many people in disadvantaged groups do not enjoy.

In this Year of Mercy, with the theme of Catholic Education Week as "Opening doors in the Year of Mercy", we are encouraged to consider those who are suffering physically, emotionally and spiritually, both in our school and in the broader community. A smile and a random act of kindness cost nothing but may make a great difference to others. During Catholic Education Week, (24 July to 30 July), our college is hosting the Western Deanery Mass in our own chapel, on Tuesday 26 July. While not all students from St Stephen's can be present for this special event, the week is dedicated to reflecting on our relationship with each other and with God. Relationships are important in every sphere of life and lessons learned at school about building positive relationships with peers and teachers help us give meaning to our lives.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL - CURRICULM

With the distribution of formal reports at the end of semester one, students have had the opportunity, over the semester break, to reflect on their performance, while setting new goals for improvement in semester two. Our Year 12 students, in particular, need to remain focused and demonstrate a very committed



work ethic in order to achieve their personal best. Reports are analysed by the Pastoral Leader of each year level, so that success can be celebrated and problems identified. This analysis of reports is beneficial in providing advice to students who need to review their subject choices. By the end of week two of this term, all subject changes should be finalised, so that students can focus on meeting their assessment commitments.

Year 8 Subject Selections

An information session for **current** Year 8 students who will be progressing to Year 9 in 2017, will be held on Thursday 4 August from 5.30 pm to 6.30 pm. Students will be issued with a handbook containing detailed information about the subjects available and instructions for using the online subject selection program (SSO).

Year 10 Subject Selections

An information session for **current** Year 10 students, who will be progressing to Year 11 in 2017, will be held on Thursday 4 August from 7.00 pm to 8.30 pm. It is imperative that parents and students attend, to gain further insight into the SET Plan (Senior Education and Training Plan) process and the requirements of the Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). The evening provides an opportunity for students to explore potential subjects to be studied in their senior years and seek advice on their pathway choices. On the evening students will receive a Senior Handbook and instructions for using the online subject selection program (SSO).

The final step in the subject selection process is an individual interview with each Year 10 student, their parent/s and one member of the school's Leadership Team to sign off on their SET Plan.

This is to ensure that students' subject selections are appropriate for their future ambition and individual learning style, and to answer any remaining questions.

Interviews will be begin on Monday 22 August, and are 15 minutes long. A booking sheet will be available on the evening of the Thursday 4 August. Alternatively, parents can contact Mrs Rosie Rantucci on 4086 2500 to make a booking.

Students who are absent or unable to attend the information evening can collect the relevant information from student services on their return to school. The P & F is offering a complimentary BBQ from 5.30 pm to 7.00 pm to all families attending the evening.

It would be great if this event was well attended by St Stephen's students, families and friends. More information is found on your Home Form noticeboard or you can speak directly with your SRC Home Form representative.


Pastoral

Our days are usually pretty packed. We are generally good at helping people, if it is on my calendar. Unfortunately, I think I often miss people who need help – but do not ask for it – when I rush through my day, moving from task to task. FROM THE GUIDANCE COUNSELLOR

Learning from failure is fundamental to student achievement and motivation at school. Failure is a part of life that everybody experiences. It is how you deal with failure that determines how much you grow and learn through your experiences.

In a school setting, it is common for students to feel like they are competing against each other. This can make failure very hard for some students as they may compare themselves to a friend or another student who has done better than them and feel as though they will never be able

to succeed at the same level. It is therefore important that teachers and parents promote failure as a positive and necessary step to improvement.

When students do not achieve the result they were hoping for, let them know that it's not because they can't do it, it's just that they can't do it yet. This will encourage them to adopt a growth mindset and see failure as an opportunity to do better next time and not a final determination of how good/bad they are at something.

As Term 3 begins, it is a great opportunity to speak with your child about their goals for the term. Make use of the laminated St Stephen's school planner sent home last term to all students in Year 7-11 and electronic copies were sent to Year 12 and all parents. It has a section for goal setting.

2016 Early School Leavers survey

The Queensland Government is conducting its annual statewide survey of students who left school in Years 10, 11 and prior to completing Year 12 during 2015. The Early School Leavers survey is a short, confidential survey that collects information about what young people are doing the year after leaving school. The information from the survey helps our schools to understand the pathways young people follow after leaving school and to plan services to support transitions into study or employment for our students. Between July and August 2016, our students who left school in Years 10, 11 and prior to completing Year 12 last year, can expect to receive an invitation to complete a web-based survey or a telephone call from the Queensland Government Statistician's Office to complete the survey. STUDENT SUCCESS STORIES

During Week 11 of last term, I had the pleasure of attending the Science Live Program organised by STEM Horizons for High Achievers. Together with nine (9) other Year 11 students from Atherton, Mareeba, Kuranda, Malanda and Ravenshoe, I travelled to Griffith



University's Nathan Campus in Brisbane. We stayed on campus, in the Bellenden Ker Residential College, where we had a brief glimpse of what university living was like.

The trip spanned from Sunday to Wednesday, although Sunday was really only a travel day. We did however get to see the EcoCentre on Sunday. On Monday we got straight into it, with an early start at 7.30 am for breakfast. By 8.30 am we were at the Eskitis Institute for Drug Discovery, also on the Nathan Campus of Griffith University. Here we were met by Professor George Mellick, Deputy Director of the Eskitis Institute and a proud resident of the Tablelands for many years. This entire program would not have been possible without Professor Mellick and his dedication towards granting students from his home region the opportunity to further their knowledge and spur their interests. At the Eskitis Institute, we were joined by seven (7) other Year 11 students from Brisbane schools, where we were split into four (4) groups. From here, we went through the process of drug discovery and were given a tour of a small sample of the institute's world-renowned Nature Bank. Nature Bank is a program established and maintained by the Eskitis Institute and its partners, and is a collection of over 63,000 plant and marine invertebrate samples from tropical Queensland, Tasmania, China, Malaysia and Papua New Guinea.

The purpose of Nature Bank is to house a library of samples to be shared with researchers, scientists, institutes and experts to aid in developing new drugs to help against many diseases. Some disease research that the Nature Bank has already contributed to include malaria, cancer, Parkinson's disease and schizophrenia. We finished off our day at the Eskitis Institute by completing a quick quiz, thanked all the staff and headed off. We had dinner in the university cafeteria (which had astoundingly good food and even a pancake machine) and headed off to explore South Bank.

On Tuesday, we had the privilege of visiting the Queensland Institute of Medical Research (QIMR) Berghofer in the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. Here we started off the day by learning about DNA testing and genetics as well as the correct use of scientific pipettes (which is surprisingly entertaining). We were also given a tour of some of the many laboratories in the institute. We were shown some of the institute's most expensive equipment, including multi-million dollar microscopes and learned about what the purpose of QIMR is. QIMR Berghofer focusses on four (4) main disease groups - cancer, infectious diseases, mental health and chronic disorders. It also stores a mind-blowing five (5) petabytes of data on diseases, cures, research and other medical data. That's over five (5) million gigabytes, stored in massive databanks on one of the higher floors of Berghofer's central building. Once we had seen everything, we headed back to Griffith University, ate dinner, and headed back to South Bank for a movie.

To sum up the program, on Wednesday we had a tour of Griffith University's quantum physics and aviation departments of the Nathan Campus, as well as Australia's first solar and hydrogen-powered building: the Sir Samuel Griffith Centre. In the aviation department, we learned about the aviation industry and used flight simulators that are used to help students learn to fly.
