FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Friends of St Stephen's

"We judge ourselves by our intentions and others by their behaviour." Stephen Covey

As we reflect on term three, the above quote is quite relevant. While most of our students would have the intention of being active learners, taking responsibility for their learning and working hard to achieve the best possible outcomes, the reality, as judged by their results, may be a very different scenario. Although sickness has contributed to high absenteeism this term, which in turn, may have affected students' performance, not all students are working to capacity. The upcoming break is an ideal time for students to consider the effort that needs to be expended in term four for improvement to occur. Over the past few weeks, I have had the pleasure of teaching Mr Fenner's year eight Mathematics class while he is on leave. For the most part, the students in this class genuinely wanted to do well and invested time to study key concepts so that their results would reflect their intentions. Staying motivated to keep doing one's best is the challenge that needs to be overcome.

Education is not just about teaching and learning in the classroom environment. There are many lessons to be learnt through interactions with others in a variety of environments. The students who are visiting our sister school in Japan will learn about the importance of fostering positive relationships when language and cultural differences present a challenge. All students who participate in the St Stephen's day celebrations on Friday 15 September will benefit from the teamwork, sense of fun and humour, commitment and gratitude which this day's activities will bring. I thank in advance all parents who are actively supporting this day by ensuring their children are in attendance until 3 pm.

I would like to extend my gratitude to our students, staff and parents for their patience, acceptance and tolerance of changes to teaching staff which we have experienced this term. It is a well-kept secret that we live in the best part of Queensland. Unfortunately, the message has not filtered to our counterparts down south. As a result, when staff go on well-earned leave or need to cope with family emergencies, the pool of relief staff which we may draw upon is very shallow. Our teachers work very hard to assist students to achieve their best and also to maintain their well-being.

To overcome the shortage of staff, we have all taken on extra classes where this was possible. This is what makes St Stephen's a good school. It comprises professionals who are ready to take on extra duties to ensure students' well-being.

Our Visual Art teacher, Ms Todd, is taking parental leave at the end of the term and we wish her the very best for the birth of her baby. Art teachers are not easy to find and we are very fortunate to have Mrs Josie Lowerson take Ms Todd's classes in term four.

Congratulations to the year twelve OP-eligible students who were conscientious in their engagement with the Queensland Core Skills Test in week eight. They are almost at the end of their marathon and are strongly encouraged to stay motivated and work hard until the very last day of testing in term four. While their formal on 7 October is foremost in their minds, there are still several weeks of active learning that needs to be completed before their graduation.

It has been a privilege to lead the school in term three and I thank the staff at St Stephen's, all students, the College Board, the P and F Association and our families for your support. I wish you a rewarding time with your children during the break and look forward to working with you in term four.

Pastoral Challenge - "There are no secrets to success"

from failure" Colin Powell 65th U.S. Secretary of State. While there may not be any secrets to success, there are definitely tools that can be used to generate success. One set of tools that can be used, is best described as a school PRIDE toolkit. On numerous occasions the challenge presented by Principal, Mrs Pinese, has been to make school PRIDE part of our everyday life at St Stephen's Catholic College. I would like to take this opportunity to share it with you.

"P" - The letter "P" in PRIDE is for perseverance – to continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty, withstanding discouragement. Perhaps one of the single important factors in achievement in life is best summed up by Victor Hugo, a French poet and novelist of the 1800's, when he claimed "Perseverance... (to be) the secret of all triumphs".

"R" is for Respect – to show consideration and regard for others' rights, including all members the college. To speak about respect is one thing; to display respect to other people, place and property is the evidence of consideration.

"I" stands for Integrity – to display honourable conduct to fulfil an obligation or keep an agreement. Integrity in everyday terms speaks of doing what you said you would do, when you said you would do it.

"D"- the letter D in PRIDE is for Dignity. Dignity refers to the state or quality of being worthy of honour – and the challenge is to treat each other accordingly. Treating others with dignity in our relationships is exactly the community that St Stephen's strives to live. It is this attitude towards the treatment of others that encourages the building of successful relationships.

Finally, the he letter "E" - stands for excellence. This is not so much a result, as it is an attitude to all we do! The call to excellence is to inspire students to be the best that they can.

It is in showing school PRIDE every day that enables our students to be the best they can be. I trust you all enjoy the holidays and have a much needed break with your families.

It has been a busy time with e-Learning this term. Students in year nine have started a pilot programme using а learning magangement system. With this useful application, students can track lessons, assignments, communicate with teachers and each other to collaborate in real time learning. This



pilot has been run in preparation for the devices being rolled out to the current year nine students next year. The combination of a touch screen Windows 10 device with a robust learning space for students, will ensure that the programme will be successful in 2018.

Many teachers have endorsed the use of Canvas (our LMS at St Stephen's) and commented on how it brings many aspects of digital learning into one place that both staff and students can teach and learn. There are many exciting initiatives in store for next year to engage students to foster collaborative learning. The device rollout for years seven and ten next year is fully underway and more information about device type and expectations on use, will be forthcoming.

Students who gain entry to a university course must have a TFN to be able to defer their fee payment through HECS-HELP, FEE-HELP or the VET Student Loan (to pay later through the tax system). This included disaster relief to Nepal, Fiji, Vanuatu, and the Philippines. I am now completing the Medical Assistant course in Wodonga, Victoria. - Participants are welcome to enter their own heifer or contact one of the committee members to arrange one


