

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of the St Stephen's community

Welcome to the 2020 school year. It was with a great flurry of joy and excitement that students returned last week, their good cheer and readiness to settle into learning augers well for a great year. I would like to take the opportunity to pay tribute to the 2019 seniors for their outstanding results. Every student in the cohort was successful in receiving either a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE), QCIA or a VET qualification. Of the OP-eligible students, 34% received an OP score between 1 and 5, with three students receiving the highest possible score of 1. In addition, we celebrate that almost 90% achieved an OP 1 - 15. Last week we welcomed the students who received an OP between 1 – 5 back to our Opening Assembly to give



the College an opportunity to congratulate them. Well done to the Class of 2019 and the staff and families who supported them.

2020 is a momentous year for the College with several events that will impact across all year levels. The 2020 year twelve cohort will be part of the most significant change to education in Queensland in over two decades with the introduction of a new Queensland Certificate of Education. These students will be the first cohort to receive an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) in place of the OP. The College is well positioned to assist the students as the new system unfolds and we will advise the details at the year twelve evening on Monday 24 February at 6.30 pm. We look forward to celebrating their leadership at our College Opening Mass and Induction of Student Leaders on Monday 17 February at 8.50 am. It is a great opportunity to see parents and friends as we commission our leaders.

Our year eleven students have settled into the rhythm of senior studies after taking time to enjoy a reflective retreat experience. We will elaborate on the new Senior System at the year eleven information evening on Monday 17 February at 6.30 pm.

Later this semester, we will open the Holy Spirit Centre, our largest capital project in the school's history. With the opening of this centre we will have capacity for the whole college to be seated in the hall which doubles as an indoor sporting facility and have an additional 200 seat auditorium. I will keep the community informed as more information regarding the opening comes to hand.

Last week we warmly welcomed 126 new year seven students, our biggest cohort ever. Congratulations must go to them as they transition into secondary school calmly and confidently. A special thank you to Mrs Jayarani Salerno and the year seven Home Form teachers, Miss Morrow, Miss Zazzi, Ms Ledlin and Mr Baker, for their kindness and care.

A reminder of the opportunity to support the College through the P & F. I wish to thank Mrs Pilat, College P & F President, and the executive for their diligent undertakings of this important role in 2019. The P & F have an pivotal role in considering priorities that impact directly on your children and the school environment. New members are very welcome. I encourage all parents and carers to come along, say hello and support the P & F this year. The Annual General Meeting will take place on Tuesday 11 February commencing at 5.30 pm in the College Board room.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

I trust that all members of the school community were able to celebrate the holidays in a relaxing and joyous manner.

This year will see a number of changes happening for many students, no more than our year twelve students who face the prospect of external exams at the end of the year as a culmination of their QCE journey.

Updates for parents of both year eleven and year twelve students will occur this term via information nights. The year twelve information night will be held on Monday 24 February, while the year eleven night will be the Monday 17 February. Information presented on these evenings will provide vital information for parents, carers and students on the new QCE system and developments in one of the greatest changes to Queensland Education for a very long time.

Minor changes to the timetable have occurred for 2020. This has meant that senior students are able to have more contact time each week with their teachers, which should improve student outcomes. Monday is a later start at 8.40 am, with Tuesday to Friday starting at 8.35 am. Each day will finish at 2.55 pm, with days consisting of six (6) by fifty (50) minute lessons. These changes should mean that all students can make home form in the morning and participate in activities built-in to this time across the year.

As a school we communicate often to parents and students about the importance of attendance. This is one of the major key reasons for academic success for students. Having high attendance will mean students do not miss key learning experiences and feedback about upcoming assessment. Feedback is another critical component to improving students outcomes. Teachers will provide students with feedback vis summative, but also formative assessment and it is the latter that will help students achieve well towards the end of the term or semester. Starting the year with the right frame of mind regarding attendance will advantage students in the future.

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BUSINESS MANAGER

Welcome back to all families for the 2020 school year. Diocesan policy is for school fees to be sent out during early each term. Although we try our best to be 100% accurate, sometimes errors can appear in the first run of school fees for the year. Items that can be inadvertently missed are sibling discounts and bus charges. If you have another child attending a Catholic School in the Diocese you are entitled to a 15% discount off your tuition fees. If there are two younger siblings at a Catholic school then the discount increases to 30% off tuition fees. Therefore, it is important that the office is informed of any sibling information.



Families that travel on the Dimbulah, Kuranda, Mossman, Atherton and Tolga buses are charged a \$25.00 per week bus fare via their school fees. Therefore, we need to know the occupants of each bus.

A 5% discount off total fees is still available for families who elect to pay their entire annual fees up-front at the beginning of the year.

Student Welfare

In attending to the welfare of students it is important that any issues are dealt with in a timely, respectful and supportive manner.



Pastoral care of students is fundamental to developing positive student wellbeing, at the heart of our mission statement and essential to sustaining the established, safe, nurturing learning environment at St Stephen's Catholic College.

It is with this in mind that the process of attending to issues is clearly outlined. Any issue of a minor nature that is class related is to first be brought to the attention of the class teacher, who is best positioned to provide a timely response. If a matter is persistent or of a more significant nature, then the College has in place the position of Middle Leaders Pastoral (MLP) who will attend to such matters in relation to their year cohorts.

Restorative Justice

Restorative Justice continues to be the model the school adopts when resolving pastoral matters. It is a way of viewing conflict and misconduct that focuses first on the harm these cause to relationships, and the obligation to repair that harm. The practice of Restorative Justice does not in any way excuse the wrongdoing or minimise the responsibility of the need to put things right; it provides a way for people to face up to the real consequences of their behaviour. The purpose is to:

- educate students towards self-directed right behaviours
- promote, nurture and protect healthy relationships among members of the school community
- enable students to take responsibility and to be accountable for the real consequences of wrongdoing

Therefore, the high expectation of students' conduct and the consistent application of restorative practices at our college sets the moral benchmark that expects all students to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with (their) God. Micah 6:8 (NIV). This verse, wholly applied to our lives, provides the very foundation for successful relationships, built on mutual respect and conveys the optimum setting for our students to achieve their personal best.

Student Leadership

With the start of a new year comes the excitement of servant leadership. It is of great importance that our student leaders in 2020 operate in a Servant Leadership mode. The job description for Leadership may not read as expected. The focus for our student leaders is:

- relationship, service and humility.
- being faithful to who you are.

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SCIENCE

Welcome to all students in science in 2020. A major change has been made to the delivery of our Science subject matter to students in years seven to ten. Students no longer have a textbook for Science. Instead, all students are enrolled with Stile, a digital platform for Science teaching. If you would like to explore what this resource has to offer, please ask your child to show you the app, or go to the stileeducation.com website.

This year sees the first cohort of year twelve students studying our four general senior science subjects under the new QCE system. These students will complete three internal assessment

tasks, and then an external exam that counts for 50% of their marks for the subject. Teachers are working with students to encourage them to incorporate revision strategies into their daily study timetable. It is imperative that students are constantly reviewing the subject matter that has been taught in order to meet the learning goals of their subjects.



INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC AT ST STEPHEN'S

Part of our active music program at St Stephen's College is the Instrumental Music Department. Instrumental music is an enrichment opportunity at St Stephen's which allows students to learn a musical instrument with a specialist instrumental teacher.

Specialist lessons include band instruments (clarinet, flute, saxophone, trumpet and trombone), percussion (including drum set), guitar and piano. Our strings program (violin, viola, cello and double bass) will also resume in week six when Mrs Livingstone returns from maternity leave. Students who take instrumental music lessons access these during school time once a week. Lessons are individual or in small groups.



Learning an instrument is an extremely beneficial experience for students. Not only does it positively affect brain function and develop skills such as concentration and fine motor movement, but music also has the power to positively impact students' emotional learning. Skills such as resilience, perseverance and commitment are enriched, and students can often find music practice a helpful stress release mechanism. Students can also engage with other like-minded peers through group ensemble participation; this can help their social/emotional growth.

St Stephen's College Instrumental Music Department is now taking enrolments for 2020. We encourage parents to review the instrumental music contract that tells you more about the program and consider enrolling their child for the new school year. No prior musical experience is required as the program is tailored to each student.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC AT ST STEPHEN'S



2020 INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC PROGRAM

Aims: Instrumental music lessons are an elective offered to students wishing to develop instrumental skills. The program offers tuition on stringed instruments, keyboard, woodwind, brass and percussion.

Lessons: Students attend lessons either individually or in a small group during the school day. The lesson times may be rotational or constant at the principal's discretion. Lessons are delivered by either private tutors or staff employed with Catholic Education Services. Expressions of Interest are taken where waiting lists exist.

Accounts: Invoices will be sent out in advance with Term Fees. The instrumental music tuition fee is \$150 per term per student. In order to accommodate for public holidays, school carnivals or curriculum activities eight (8) half hour lessons will be allocated to the student each term. Music books will be purchased on behalf of a student and billed as they are issued.

The following are included as billable lessons:

- · Student receives lesson as per normal
- Student forgets lesson time or instrument which results in student missing lesson
- Student is absent from school (excludes prolonged absence from school where the teacher is informed that the student will be away)

Withdrawal from the Program:

Students enroll for the school year, but may withdraw at the end of a term. Three weeks' notice to withdraw from lessons must be given in writing prior to the beginning of the next term.

Hire costs may be subject to an increase at the beginning of each year. Instruments must be returned before the end of the school year. Parents are required to pay for any instrument damage resulting from neglect.

String students will also have the opportunity to attend string orchestra rehearsals.

GUIDANCE COUNSELLOR

Welcome back to the 2020 school year.

My office is again in the M-Block staff room and students can make an appointment by coming to my office or emailing me at hmuratmaks@cns.catholic.edu.au. Parents can also email or call me at the school to refer their child.

At the end of 2019, I took leave to have back surgery in Brisbane. Having major surgery and spending a week in hospital sounds like a horrible thing but actually turned out to be a blessing

in disguise, as it taught me many things. Being weak and bed-bound taught me what it IS like to feel truly helpless. Being unable to perform everyday activities like showering and feeding myself, while a very humbling experience, also taught me that it is okay to ask for help and sometimes it is necessary. I had to ask my mother, father and husband to help with almost everything for the first few weeks as I could not bend or walk very well. This experience also taught me that no matter how hard things are for me, there are always people who are suffering even more and that I should look for the blessings in my situation. I walked around the hospital corridors getting exercise during my stay and saw lots of patients who had no one to help them like I did. People who had been stuck in hospital for months. People with no visitors while I was blessed to have many. Witnessing the suffering of others showed me that I should be grateful and give thanks for all the people in my life who were there to support me. It also taught me to give thanks to God for putting those people in my life and to look for the blessing in my suffering rather than giving in to pain and self-pity. These are lessons that are hard to learn but can transform suffering into patience and gratitude if you are willing.

So how does this relate to our students? I would like our students to feel comfortable reaching out for help before things get too hard and knowing that it is more than okay to do so. I want also like them to know that there is no shame in needing help and there are lot of things I can help them with, including:

- Improving their academic achievement and setting goals
- Improving their organisation, time management and study habits
- Working through personal problems with friends and family
- Improving their social skills and making more friends
- Coping with grief and trauma
- Identifying their strengths and interests and building self-esteem and confidence
- Identifying concerns with mental health issues such as depression and anxiety
- Listening to then and helping them work out what their issue is when they feel uncertain or find it difficult to articulate
- Referring students onwards if they require more help than I can provide at school

Counselling is confidential and details will not be shared with others unless the student or someone they speak about is in danger of being harmed. Participation in counselling is also voluntary and students must be willing to participate. I look forward to serving the students of our school again this year and wish everyone a productive and blessed year.

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PARENT SLIPS: DISTRIBUTION OF SCHOOL SLIPS

St Stephen's Catholic College has implemented Parent Slips (via EdSmart.com) to assist with communication between the school and parents. Parent Slips is an online system that replaces all the paper forms we send home for you to complete and return. The online system is extremely easy for parents to use. Instead of paper forms coming home in your child's school bag, you will be sent an email notification, with a link to click that opens a secure web page version of the form to complete and submit. You can do this on your phone, tablet or computer. You do not need to download any apps or register. The online system is a much more efficient way to capture all this information from you and means teachers and the administration staff can easily keep tracked their forms. All of the data you submit in the forms is held in a secure database and is only accessible to selected school staff.



Information for Parents

EdSmart is a web browser based online tool to capture information and responses for your childrens' activities. Your school purchases an annual subscription to the EdSmart system and uses it to distribute online forms for you to complete and submit.

Why do schools use EdSmart?

If you stop and think about it, schools spend considerable amounts of time managing paper forms, even a modest sized school is creating, copying, distributing and collating hundreds and hundreds of paper forms every year. By switching to online forms the school is able to save many, many hours of staff time, and free up that time for more important activities, like teaching and supporting your children. And of course reducing paper usage is also fantastic for the environment.

How does it work for a parent?

After an email or SMS notification, there is an online form waiting for you. You simply click the link shown in the email and a secure web page will open, containing information from the school, and various questions for you to complete and answer. Some forms include Google Maps, to show you where the activity is taking place. Some may have a calendar icon you can click to add the activity to your own electronic diary, like fluttook or Google Calendar.

Do I need to do anything to register or set up?

No. EdSmart does not use mobile apps or any special software. You do not need to register or set anything up. All you need is an email address and a web browser. And all the EdSmart web pages are specifically designed to work great on desktop computers, tablets and smartphones.

Is my information safe?

EdSmart stores your information in a secure data centre operated by Microsoft in Melbourne, Australia, and is compliant with all aspects of the relevant Australian privacy legislation. The information is only accessible to a select group of staff at your school. If you are a UK-based school you can read our Data Sharing Agreement.




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
