To all who have joined our St Stephen's family this year, welcome to a nurturing environment which values the dignity of the individual and strives to form people who are morally autonomous with an awareness of God's presence. At our first assembly this year, students were encouraged to "let their light shine" in all aspects of college life, keeping in mind the many opportunities to practise acts of mercy in this jubilee year.

YEAR 12 RESULTS

The 2015 cohort certainly allowed their light to shine by achieving excellent results, as 100% of students were awarded a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). In terms of OP scores, the college has once again obtained impressive results, with 26% of students achieving scores between 1 and 5 and 91% of the OP-eligible students gaining scores from 1 to 15.

While all students are to be commended for their efforts in achieving results commensurate with their application, the St Stephen's community would like to congratulate William Snell and Mark Wilcox for their excellent outcomes in achieving OP scores of 1 and 2 respectively. William Snell was the College Dux for 2015, receiving the subject prizes for five out of his six subjects. Most students were also awarded their first preference in their university

course selections. Not only have the more academically-inclined students done well, but those who chose a vocational pathway are also to be praised for their efforts in combining study with their traineeships and apprenticeships. They have demonstrated commitment, effective time management and pride in their achievement. I would like to thank our teachers and parents for their strong support of these students in their final year of schooling.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL CURRICULUM

Welcome back. 2016 sees the implementation of the Senior Pathways Program, transitioning to ACARA Phase 2 in year 9 and 10, and the beginning of a transition to a new senior assessment system to be introduced in Queensland with students commencing Year 11 in 2018. I would like to acknowledge the dedicated teaching staff who have spent many hours developing these programs in readiness for another school year.

Year 7 parents and other families new to the college are encouraged to attend our 'meet and greet' evening. The 'meet and greet' is an informal opportunity to become acquainted with the college's teaching staff. Parents are encouraged to use their student's timetable to make a



list of their child's teachers. A copy of the timetable can be found in the Student Record Book (SRB). Information relating to curriculum, including homework expectations and assessment will be conveyed during the second part of the evening.

Students in Years 9 to 12 who wish to make changes to their subjects need to see me as soon as possible. In Years 9 and 10, changes can only be made to electives and, provided the class into which the student wishes to go is not at full capacity, notification by students will suffice. In Years 11 and 12 where subject changes can have implications for both OP scores and QCE eligibility, students need to make an appointment to see me, after which formal documentation will be completed to effect the change. The deadline for semester one changes is Friday 5 February.

All students who were in Years 8 to 10 last year may ask for the return of their assignment work, (with the task sheet removed) if they wish. Tests are not returned as we often include similar questions in future assessment. Year 11 and 12 work is not returned as it is needed for quality assurance processes. Senior students are encouraged to approach their subject teachers if they wish to view their folio of work. All requests must be made via a request form at student services by Friday 5 February.

The assignment calendar can be accessed via the college website. Students and parents are strongly encouraged to place this supplement in a prominent place at home with due dates for assignments clearly highlighted. Effective planning is essential to identifying achievable goals, as a step by step sequence of tasks helps students to focus on moving forward.

I look forward to another fulfilling year of working with students in the area of curriculum and thank you in advance for your support in this endeavour.

FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

Welcome back to all families for the 2016 school year. Diocesan policy is for tuition fees to be sent out during week two of each term. Although we try our best to be 100% accurate, sometimes errors can appear in the first run of school fees for the year.

Items that may be inadvertently missed are sibling discounts and bus charges. If you have another child attending a Catholic School in the Diocese, you are entitled to a 15% discount on tuition fees. If there are two younger siblings at a Catholic school, then the discount increases to 30% of tuition fees. Therefore, it is important that the office is informed of any sibling information.



Families that travel on the Dimbulah, Kuranda, Mossman, Atherton and Tolga buses are charged a \$33 per week bus fare via their school fees. Therefore, we need to know the occupants of each bus. In 2011, the College Board approved a 5% discount on total fees for families who pay their entire fees up-front at the beginning of the year.

While the College is in holiday mode for staff and students, it provides a gap for much of our maintenance and construction work to occur. Year of Mercy

On December 8, 2015, Pope Francis opened the Holy Door of St Peter's to mark the beginning of the Year of Mercy. Throughout 2016, the Catholic Church is called to highlight its mission to be a witness of mercy, and in turn, our school community will focus on this calling. Pope Francis challenges us to open the doors of our hearts and minds in order to live out God's mercy in our lives and to be compassionate and forgiving people. He asks us to be merciful to others as God is merciful to us.



Ash Wednesday is an opportunity for us to commit to this challenge as we gather as a college community to receive ashes on our forehead as an outward expression of our resolve to begin again, to journey more closely with God, to strive to live the Gospel, to be people of love, forgiveness and mercy.

What is Ash Wednesday?

This year, Ash Wednesday occurs on February 10, 40 days before the Easter season, marking the beginning of Lent. It is a time when we stop and assess how we're doing in our walk with God and others as well as identify spiritual areas in which we can grow and sinful areas that we need to avoid. Lent is a season of repentance; to repent means to turn away from sin and turn toward God. On Ash Wednesday, ashes are applied to our foreheads in the shape of the cross. We use ashes as an outward expression of our need to begin again – in our relationship with God and our relationships with others.

Why do we wear ashes?

For over twelve hundred years on the dies cinerum (day of ashes), faithful followers have approached the altar and received ashes upon their foreheads. These ashes come from the burnt palm fronds that were blessed on the Palm Sunday of the previous year. They are sprinkled with holy water, usually fragranced with incense and blessed using four prayers.

In Old Testament times, people used ashes as an outward sign of repentance. They would sit in ashes, roll around in them, sprinkle them upon their heads, or even mingle them with their food and drink.

Ashes are a sign of physical death ('ashes to ashes, dust to dust'). By receiving ashes and keeping them on, we publicly proclaim our desire to die to our selfish and sinful ways and live in Christ's image.

The services that counsellors are able to provide for students and families in Catholic schools include such matters as:

- Providing information sessions for classes on current topics such as bullying issues, healthy relationships, goal setting and organization, selfesteem and resilience.
- Working with small groups on issues such as anger management, self-confidence, resilience and assertiveness, grief and loss, positive thinking and stress issues.
- Discussions with parents and staff regarding concerns about student performance, behaviour or emotional well-being.

Counselling sessions for matters relating to a broad range of issues such as, family dynamics, friendship concerns, poor self-esteem, bullying concerns, behavioural concerns, grief and loss and general personal concerns.

Term 1, 2016 is full of exciting ventures for the Gifted and Talented Enrichment area.

The Emerging Entrepreneurs Program starts Thursday; February 4. This is a nine week course which will help young adults nurture their ideas and turn these ideas into reality. Students will cover topics such as developing ideas, creating business plans, marketing models and creating a viable product.

The Australian Brain Bee Challenge (ABBC) is a competition for budding year 10 scientists to learn about the brain and its functions, learn about neuroscience research, find out about careers in neuroscience and to dispel misconceptions about neurological and mental illnesses. SS MATHEMATICS

Without mathematics, there's nothing you can do. Everything around you is mathematics. Everything around you is numbers. - Shakuntala Devi

Students either love it or hate it, but there is no denying the importance that Mathematics has (or will have) in our lives. Mathematics is a subject which requires regular practice and revision, and it is important that students are spending time at home consolidating concepts and revising work. While teachers will be giving students regular mathematics homework, it is also essential that students are undertaking their own home study which could involve revising book work, completing further questions from the textbook, compiling a revision sheet or attending mathematics tutoring for extra help.

MATHEMATICS TUTORING: Mathematics tutoring will be offered during second recess on Tuesdays and Thursdays again this year in MCR. All students are welcome to attend. There will also be after school tutoring available in the library on Wednesdays from 3-4 pm, starting in Week 4, for years 10-12.

MATHEMATICS TEXTBOOKS 2016: In 2016, we are trialling a new system for the hiring of mathematics textbooks. Junior textbooks will be stored in classrooms instead of students hiring out individual textbooks.

Students will store an electronic (PDF) version of the textbook on their USB sticks and can access the text on computers or laptops at home. The purpose of this trial is to alleviate some of the weight from students' heavy backpacks, and also to reduce wear and



tear on the textbooks. Students are still very welcome to hire an individual textbook and bring it to and from school if this is what they would prefer. Students can see Mrs Gillies in the resource centre if they would like to get their mathematics textbook.

HORIZON SCHOLARSHIPS FOR AGRICULTURE

The Horizon Scholarship has been developed to support the next generation of agricultural leaders, who will take up the challenge of farming for the future. It is for young people who are passionate about agriculture, with a keen interest in the future of our industries and who are ready to expand their networks and learn new skills.

The Horizon Scholarship is an initiative of the Rural Industries Research and Development Corporation that, in partnership with industry sponsors, supports undergraduates studying agriculture at university by providing:

- A bursary of \$5,000 per year for the duration of their degree

- Annual industry work placements that give students first-hand exposure to modern agricultural practices
