FROM THE Principal

Dear Parents, Carers and Friends of St Stephen's

"Life wasn't meant to be easy...but take courage child, for it can be delightful."

REFLECTION

As the first term of 2015 draws to a close, it is an opportune time to reflect on the journey since the start of the academic year. With the arrival of a double cohort of students beginning their secondary education in January, the college community rose to the exciting challenge of welcoming almost 200 new students. While it was not an easy task, the preparations which were put in place the previous year have made the transition from primary to secondary schooling a positive experience. These students, in general, have whole-heartedly embraced our culture, improved their organisational skills and enjoyed their first term of high school. Their presence has enriched our college community and I extend my gratitude to parents, teachers, supporting staff and the older students for assisting our new arrivals to settle into our St Stephen's family.

FEEDBACK

Constructive feedback is important for continuous improvement. On 17 March, our teachers engaged with professional development aimed at making them the best teachers they can be. Evidence from research studies has indicated that a child's teacher is one of the most important influences in determining successful outcomes. In order to improve our practices, effective feedback is essential. The purpose of the workshop conducted by Steve Francis, (creator of "Happy Schools"), was to introduce our teachers to the culture of feedback which we plan to action over the next eighteen months.

Opportunities exist for teachers and the school community to provide feedback about the recommendations for changes to Senior Schooling proposed by ACER (Australian Council for Educational Research) in its review of senior schooling in Queensland. While the changes will not impact on the current years 10, 11 and 12 students, other cohorts may experience a different assessment structure in the senior phase of learning. If the current government adopts the recommendations of the ACER review, there will be major changes to how assessment in the senior school is conducted.

HOLY THURSDAY: 2 April

In keeping with the Catholic ethos of our college, during the day on Holy Thursday, the college community will gather for the Stations of the Cross which remind us of the great sacrifice Jesus made for our sins. Members of the Social Justice Committee will lead us through the fourteen stations, relating Jesus' suffering to our actions in the school context. I sincerely thank Mrs Gilbert and Miss Sugars for the time and effort they have devoted to the organisation of this important event in the Church's calendar.



UPDATES FOR TERM TWO

On Thursday 23 April, the college community will commemorate Anzac Day. This year's ceremony is special as it marks the 100th anniversary of the ANZAC landing at Gallipoli. Our college leaders, choir and cadets are currently preparing for this auspicious occasion and I thank the Anzac Day Committee for its organisation of this event.

As in previous years, the college community will be a presence at both the dawn service and the downtown march in Mareeba. Those who have a leadership position, and other students who wish to join us have been invited to attend the morning march in Mareeba. I thank you in advance for your support in ensuring your child is available. For those students who reside in Mossman, Dimbulah or Atherton, our feeder Catholic schools in these towns would appreciate our students marching in the St Stephen's uniform with the relevant primary school. The commitment which students demonstrate by attending the services in their towns each Anzac Day is commendable.


In 2015, work experience for year 10 students will take a different format. Information about the options available will be sent home in the year 10 interim reports. If there are any questions about the process, parents are encouraged to contact the Deputy Principal, Ms Chiesa, who is managing work experience this year.

The experience with overnight camps in 2014 for five cohorts, made us realise how unsustainable it was to continue with this model. Unlike primary schools where the teachers of a particular year level take their students on camp without having to leave work for other classes, in the secondary setting teachers can have classes ranging from year 7 to year 12. It becomes difficult, therefore, to find relief teachers to cover the classes they leave behind. Disruption to the learning of those year levels not on camp has to be considered. At any time, there can be five or more teachers out of school with at least four or five classes each which must be covered with supervisors for the duration of the camp. Therefore in 2015, the following overnight camps are occurring: Year 12 Retreat, Year 7 Camp and Year 8 Camp, with a final decision not yet made on the Year 11 Leadership Experience. Other cohorts may have day excursions organised by their Pastoral Leaders. Notices will be sent home in advance of any proposed outings.

In conclusion, I wish you a Holy Easter as you spend quality time as a family with your children. Thank you for your support and assistance this term, especially for ensuring that your child is in attendance until 3 pm on 2 April. I look forward to working with you all in term two.

FROM THE Deputy Principal Curriculum



By the time this article goes to print, assessment for term one is complete and interim reports have been prepared, in readiness for posting on the last day of term. It is to be remembered, however, that the comments on these reports are based on a teacher's observations and testing for a short period of approximately nine weeks. In some cases, students may be submitting their first piece of assessment for this year, at the start of term two. Therefore, the report is general in nature, while still providing parents with an indication of their child's academic progress, work ethic and behaviour during term one.

Parent teacher interviews will take place on Wednesday, 22 April from 3.30 pm to 7.30 pm. The College uses an online system called Parent Teacher Online for parents to make the necessary appointments with the student's subject teachers. All the relevant information, including usernames and passwords, will be posted home with the interim report. The parent teacher interview session is an opportunity for feedback to be provided about a student's progress and all parents are strongly encouraged to attend. Time slots are limited to five minutes per subject. Parents wishing to have a longer discussion about a specific issue may arrange another meeting with the relevant teacher at a date which suits both parties. Please adhere to the allocated time, so that other parents are not inconvenienced. If you have specific availability requirements please ensure you book early.

If you are a parent of a Year 12 student and would like to know more information about the Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE), Overall Position (OP), opportunities for students beyond high school or entry to university and TAFE, I encourage you to attend our Year 12 parent information evening on Wednesday 29 April. Parents should have received a letter providing further details about the evening with an intention to attend slip. If you did not receive this letter but would like to attend, please contact our careers officer, Mrs Murat.

Year 11 and 12 students should use the holidays for reflection. Subject changes can only occur up until the end of Week 3 of each Semester. After that students are required to remain in the subject for the duration of the semester. If students are changing later than this, then they get too far behind the other students in work commitments. It is not possible to credit a full semester's work for the QCAA's calculations, when students swap mid-semester. Poor performance or disappointed expectations can lead to rash decisions about changing courses of study, future procrastination or no effort at all. Overcoming barriers is the key to continuing progress. Five important strategies for dealing with obstacles are;

- Focus on the goal
- Identify the steps that need to be taken
- Acknowledge and learn from the past
- Plan and identify strategies for over-coming barriers
- Remain optimistic

I would like to thank all teachers for their conscientious efforts in the delivery of the curriculum this term, and parents for the support they provide to their children. I hope our students have a safe and relaxing break and recharge their batteries in readiness for term two.

Welcome to the Mathematics Department for 2015. I hope we will be able to keep you-up-to-date regarding student activities and other interesting news this year.

As a NUMERACY INITIATIVE this year, the Mathematics Department has enrolled all Junior School students (Years 7–10) with the IXL numeracy software which can be accessed from school and at home. Student login is at:

IXL's mathematics skills are aligned to the Australian Curriculum, providing comprehensive coverage of maths concepts and applications. With IXL's National Curriculum alignments, you can easily find unlimited practice problems specifically tailored to each learning objective.

Since IXL allows students to practise in all year levels, accelerated students can always skip ahead to find skills that suit their needs. Students who practise in a higher year level will not only encounter more advanced subject matter, but more sophisticated problem types as well—making IXL an ideal option for students who desire a challenge.

Whenever a student practises on IXL, the program automatically adapts to his or her individual skill level. This means that if a student is doing well with a particular concept, the problems will increase in difficulty so that the student remains engaged and excited about learning maths.

Parents also have access to curriculum reporting, so that working toward achievement goals can be both an in-school and at-home endeavour. I encourage parents to engage with their students in this excellent numeracy initiative.

This term the Gifted and Talented Enrichment area provided opportunities for students to participate in a variety of different programs.

We Remember Anzac


