FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Friends of St Stephen's

"The College fosters a harmonious, safe and nurturing learning environment that supports students in developing respect, responsibility and confidence." (SSCC Mission Statement)

The above extract from the college's Mission Statement embodies the culture of St Stephen's. While our staff strive to ensure that students have the opportunity to learn in a safe and supportive environment, our students must also demonstrate respect for self and others, assume responsibility for their learning and grow in confidence to take their place as future citizens.

Respect is at the heart of every interaction that takes place at our college. Since the last newsletter went to print, irresponsible behaviour caused damage to an area of our buildings. Not only was the integrity of the perpetrators compromised, but also those who witnessed the event and did nothing are at fault. It is important that our students grow in confidence to be able to stand up for what is right, for to say nothing condones this wilful act.

In the same manner, there needs to be accountability for one's learning. In the weeks following the interim reports, some very candid conversations are being held with parents and students about their child's work ethic and application to study. This is particularly relevant to year eleven students. The gap between year ten and eleven is quite significant, despite our teachers' efforts to narrow that gap in the second semester of year ten. While some students have risen to the challenge of year eleven and are achieving good results, others are simply at school for the social experience. Therefore, for some students, this "wake up" call is what is required to force them to take responsibility for their learning.

At times, it is necessary for students to risk failure, so that they can learn from their mistakes. If students' lives are micro-managed, they are inappropriately shielded from the experiences and consequences of disappointment, failure and regret. A change in teachers, often inevitable, exposes students to different pedagogical styles and builds resilience. Although well meaning, parents are not doing their children any favours by protecting them from life's challenges.

On a more positive note, I would like to congratulate our cross country runners for their stellar effort at the District Championships. As committed athletes, they demonstrated perseverance, resilience, teamwork and true grit.

This week also marks a significant academic event in the lives of the year seven and nine students who are completing the NAPLAN test. I sincerely thank our teaching staff for their preparation of students for this national test and wish all students the very best over the three days of testing.

As I mentioned in previous newsletters, I am embarking on a study tour of schools in New York and Canada from 15 to 26 May. During this time, Ms Chiesa will be Acting Principal. Thank you in advance for your support of the Leadership Team in my absence. I am looking forward to observing practices in different schools and sharing these with our community upon my return. Best wishes also to Mr Frank Caines who is taking three weeks long service leave from 22 May to 9 June.

The Headspace website www. headspace.org.au, lists resources for parents and schools.


I strongly recommend that you make yourself aware of the content your child is viewing and take the opportunity to discuss important ideas and issues.

This seminar is intended for parents and adults supporting young people and it will be held on Thursday 11 May from 12.00 pm to 1.00 pm (AEST). It is important that young people know that there are many supportive adults at school and in your family networks to offer them support if they are feeling depressed, suicidal or being bullied. FROM THE CURRICULUM LEADER - SOCIAL SCIENCE AND BUSINESS

Year Nine History

As a part of the WW1 unit in year nine History, Mrs Crockford's students wrote a diary entry for a day in the life of an ANZAC soldier. Several were very well-written and quite moving. Please refer to page seven of the newsletter for the examples written by Jasper Bloore and Catriona Boyd.



Year Twelve Geography

Year twelve Geography students are completing a social geography unit that looks at the ways people 'connect to place'. There are obvious physical connections through infrastructure such as roads, railways and optic fibres, but there are also emotional, spiritual and cultural connections that influence how we view and use places also. Students completed fieldwork to examine how fear can be mitigated to encourage people to reclaim places for social purposes. In this case, students conducted interviews and surveys, and assessed the ways crime (or perceptions of crime) could be prevented through the design of the built and natural environment of Main Street, in Atherton, so that families would be drawn to use the area as a social space after dark. Discussions with a town planner, police officer and venue manager provided input from influential stakeholders and will assist with the analysis of findings and recommendations of the students.



School Business Challenge

The School Business Challenge is a competition conducted by CQUniversity in which teams of four students are challenged to correctly answer a number of multiple choice questions on diverse businessrelated subjects. Students representing St Stephen's on Tuesday night were Alex Milton, Sabine Conolly, Darcy Hallam and Isabelle Nisbet (pictured below).



Year Ten Study of Humanities

This subject combines the two National Curriculum areas of Economics and Business, and Civics and Citizenship, so the students study two terms of each. This term we are working on a unit called 'Sustainable Business Practices' which leads into many senior subject areas, particularly 'Business Management'. The students' assignment looks at what sustainable practices large international organisations have and how they interline with legislation in Australia. Hopefully, students will gain a better understanding of what practices work and which do not.

Diary of a soldier "A Day in the Life of an ANZAC"

Oh God, oh God, why did I sign up for this? I came here for an adventure, and that offer has been fulfilled, unfortunately. I didn't really sleep last night. I was so hungry and thirsty – they don't feed ya much grub out here, ay. I keep thinking about the horrible things I have witnessed: people and animals being shot by those bloody Turks. I kept thinking I was next. I should have just stayed home. I was the man of the house ever since my dad died from working in the mines when I was young. I hope my family is going well. They told me in a letter that there was a drought. Anyway, I'm in the reserve trench at the time of writing this, sweating like a pig. I've been doing this for a while, but I don't have a good feeling about today. But how are you supposed to be? Leaping and bounding about, killing and being killed, shooting and being shot, bombing and being bombed, gassing and being gassed. This war's getting out of hand. Any second of any minute of any day could be my last. How do I know that this isn't the last time I ever write in this journal? I've had good mates wounded and even killed in this mess. What's even the point? A waste of lives if you ask me. And I thought digging the trenches was going to be the worst part! I cried for the first time in a long time, last night. I really don't know how to handle this anymore. I should talk to my mates about this. Oh God, will I ever see my family again? I love them so much: my brother, my sister and my mum, the animals, my friends, and of course, the creek, where lots of memories were made. Oh damn, it's my turn to fight. Wish me luck!

It's quiet. Too damn quiet. Am I dead? If I'm not, then it's a miracle. I'm using the light of my second last cigarette to write. Damn. With all this going on, these fags are the only thing remotely close to home. It's black, almost dark blue. I'm guessing we're about three hours away from dawn. And it's quiet. We have only the unfriendly whisperings in the wind and the gunfire in our heads to listen to. We arrived on the Turkish shore about two weeks ago. I remember it as though it was yesterday. We landed on the shore roughly and jumped out. I was praying to God that I would make it, but now I wish I hadn't.

The shells and bullets of machine guns whistled by me as I ran. I watched my mates fall as I ran, seeing their expressions as they hit the blood-soaked rocks. But I survived; God, I don't deserve it. Good kids from happy homes, dying in a real-life hell. God bless them.

Update: it's almost dawn now, and people are starting to stir, but they aren't awake – they weren't asleep to begin with. The terrors of war infect and crawl through our minds like mustard gas. I don't know if this will be my last letter. They're sending us over the top soon. I hope I die. I welcome it. I do not wish to stay in this hell any longer. I will lay down my life for my mates, for the fallen, and for my country. Australia, I did my best.

FROM THE CAREERS OFFICER

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY (ACU) PATHWAY PROGRAMMES

If your OP does not get you into the degree course you want at ACU, there are several pathway options available at ACU.

Upgrade through a year of a less competitive degree at ACU. For example, if you want entry to B Midwifery, passing a year of a less competitive course like ACU's B Applied Public Health would give you the score you need to gain entry to midwifery the following year.

Alternatively, you could consider one of ACU's Pathway programmes. ACU offers Diplomas, Certificates and VET (Vocational Education and Training) courses that may help you gain entry to your preferred course. It is helpful to select a Pathway programme related to your preferred degree. It is also important to check with ACU as to whether the Pathway course you choose will provide direct entry to your preferred ACU degree.

UNIVERSITY OF QUEENSLAND (UQ) ECONOMICS SCHOLARSHIPS

UQ's School of Economics is offering two new scholarships for year twelve students:

- Year Twelve Australian Domestic Students' Scholarship (called 'UQ Economics Scholarships for Current Year Twelve students' on the UQ Scholarships website: https://scholarships.uq.edu.au) Valued at \$5,000.00 per year for up to three years. Applications close on 3 November 2017.
- Year Twelve Equity and Diversity Scholarship Valued at \$5,000.00 per year for up to three years of study. It also includes professional mentoring. Students who have experienced social or emotional setbacks throughout senior school, or are from Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander or low socio-economic backgrounds are encouraged to apply. Applications close on 28 November 2017.

YEAR 12 POST SCHOOL FOLDER

Year twelve students are strongly advised to start a folder of information they will need later in the year and early next year. Keep this folder in your room at home and add to it during the year. Items that could be placed in this folder include:

- LUI and password for your Learning Account so you can access your year twelve results early. You will also be required to know your LUI to complete your QTAC application.
- Tax File Number (TFN), which you will need to apply for a HELP loan next year. You also need a TFN if you want to be paid for a full-time or part-time job.
- The QTAC Guide, which you will receive in May/June.
- Course, job and tertiary entry information you gather at career markets/expos, institution open days, TSXPO, etc.
- The list of courses you are considering (make an appointment to see your Guidance Counsellor/Officer ASAP, if you require assistance).
- Handouts on tertiary entry you are given at year twelve assemblies, expos and lunchtime talks.
- Information about available scholarships and tips for submitting a great application.
- Additional qualifications you might wish to submit as part of your QTAC application.
- Any other information related to your plans for 2018.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT CHANGES - SCHOOL FUNDING

Federal Government changes create uncertainty for school funding

Over the last week you will have heard significant discussion in the media about school funding and Catholic schools in particular. The funding package announced by the Prime Minister and the Education Minister includes a number of changes that should be of concern to us as a Catholic school community. While the package includes a base funding increase beyond what had previously been proposed by the Federal Government, it also alluded to a number of changes to the existing funding system which may impact on the overall level of funding to Queensland Catholic schools.

The Catholic education sector is concerned the Federal Government has, to date, been unable to provide the necessary detail to allay concerns about potential funding reductions. Some key points of concern include:

- The absolute failure of the Federal Government to consult with the Catholic sector before announcing its proposed changes
- The lack of detail and so a heightened sense of uncertainty about our future funding position
- Proposed changes to the funding model which target Catholic school systems and which will potentially reduce our funding and impact on fee levels in schools.

The Catholic education sector has urged the Federal Government to urgently meet Catholic education representatives to provide more detail about how the proposed changes will impact on schools, teachers and parents and to negotiate an acceptable outcome.
