## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

#### Dear Parents and Friends of St Stephen's

Welcome to the 2018 school year. As we begin a new school year, I am reminded of the Chinese proverb that "a journey of one thousand miles begins with one step". That first step was taken in 2006 when St Stephen's commenced operation with a cohort of forty, year eight students. Entering its thirteenth year, St Stephen's now has a staff of eighty-four and 566 students.



One aspect which has not changed as the school has grown, has been the sense of family

and a strong focus on respect, responsibility and confidence in a faith-based culture. Last Monday, our college welcomed the newest members of the St Stephen's family—116, year seven students. I am very grateful to the year seven Pastoral Leader, Mrs Salerno and the home form teachers for the caring manner in which they supported these students in the transition from primary to secondary school.

Continuing the legacy of academic excellence set by past cohorts, the seniors of 2017 achieved outstanding results. Not only did every student achieve a Queensland Certificate of Education, but 40% of OP-eligible students gained between a 1 and 5, placing the college on a par with high achieving city schools in South East Queensland. In the majority of cases our students received their first preference of tertiary studies. The college community is very proud of their efforts and wishes them the very best with their future studies or the world of work.

In keeping with the demands of the 21st century with its focus on digital learning, our year seven and ten students will benefit with the roll-out of a one-to-one device. Every student in these two cohorts should now have received the device and I encourage parents to contact the E-learning Leader, Mr Richard Baker, if there are still unanswered questions about the program.

During the summer break, major projects were completed. The new Music Block allows students to enjoy the improved facilities for instrumental music tuition, band and choir practice, as well as music studies from years seven to twelve. To cater for increased numbers in year seven, another break-out area near the library has been developed for student use at recess times. It is hoped that these extra facilities will enhance the students' experience of school life at St Stephen's.

Teachers have the greatest impact on a student's learning. We are pleased to welcome eleven new teachers and three non-teaching staff to St Stephen's in 2018. (Refer to the relevant section in the newsletter for information about our new staff.) On 12 February, there will be a "Meet and Greet" evening for parents and carers of year seven students. This is an informal event where parents can meet their child's teachers, as well as other parents. We are grateful to the Parents and Friends Association for hosting a BBQ on this occasion.

The 21st century is best described as an era of change and education is no exception. In 2019, the current year ten students will be the first to graduate under the new Queensland Certificate of Education system which is significantly different from the current system. To inform parents and carers of these changes, there will be a year ten information evening on Tuesday 13 February. As well as key members of the senior leadership team, we are very honoured to have Dr Judy Smeed from Education Outcomes in attendance.

She will speak briefly about the ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) which will replace the current OP (Overall Position) score. Parents of year ten students will receive a letter about this evening in the near future and I strongly encourage everyone to attend.

To enhance our Catholic Identity, inspirational signs have been placed in the main teaching blocks to motivate our students to live the Mission Statement of the college. At assemblies, students are urged to adopt the PRIDE philosophy by demonstrating perseverance, respect, integrity, dignity and excellence in their interactions with the members of our St Stephen's community and beyond. While teaching and learning is the core business of the college, we are mindful of developing whole people who are compassionate, kind, emphatic, grateful and resilient, while seeing the face of Jesus in all those with whom they come into contact.

The success of any school is reliant on the positive relationships that are formed between teachers, students and their families. I value the feedback that parents provide to improve our practices and the opportunities for students. Their well-being is at the focus of all that we do. I thank you all sincerely for sending your students to school for the start of the year with all the necessary materials and invite you to be active participants in our college through the Parents and Friends Association which meets once a term.



## FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

Welcome back to all families for the 2018 school year. I hope all families had the opportunity to have a relaxing break.

Diocesan policy is for school fees to be sent out during week two of each term.



Although we try our best to be 100% accurate, sometimes errors can appear in the first run of school fees for the year. Items that can be inadvertently missed are sibling discounts and bus charges.

If you have another child attending a Catholic School in the Diocese you are entitled to a 15% discount off your tuition fees. If there are two younger siblings at a Catholic school then the discount increases to 30% off tuition fees. Therefore, it is important that the office is informed of any sibling information.

Families that travel on the Dimbulah, Kuranda, Mossman, Atherton and Tolga buses are charged a \$20.00 per week bus fare via their school fees. Therefore, we need to know the occupants of each bus.

In 2011 the College Board approved a 5% discount off total fees for families who pay their entire fees upfront at the beginning of the year. This will continue to be offered in 2018.

If you have an existing direct debit occurring, you must ensure that it will be enough to cover the full amount of fees across the year. You may need to increase the regular payment amount, especially if your child is moving from junior to senior. Our aim is to have all families with a nil balance owing as at the end of the school year. ## FROM THE COLLEGE LEADER PASTORAL CARE

#### **Student Welfare**

Welcome back to all our parents and students. I am looking forward to continuing strong partnerships with parents and students this year, building on 2017. As College Leader Pastoral Care, welfare of students is core to my role. In attending to the welfare of students it is important that any issues are dealt with in a timely, respectful and supportive manner. Pastoral care of students is fundamental to developing positive student wellbeing, at the heart of our mission statement and essential to sustaining the established, safe, nurturing learning environment at St Stephen's Catholic College.

It is with this in mind that the process of attending to issues is clearly outlined. Any issue of a minor nature that is class-related is to first be brought to the attention of the class teacher, who is best positioned to provide a timely response. If a matter is persistent or of a more significant nature, then the College has in place the position of Middle Leaders Pastoral (MLP) who will attend to such matters in relation to their year cohorts. Parents wishing to contact or make an appointment with an MLP, can do so via our school office or emailing the MLP directly. Contact details can be directly accessed through the school's website.

If a matter is unresolved, persistent or of a serious nature, then I will be directly involved to ensure the matter is attended to swiftly and respectfully.

#### **Restorative Justice**

Restorative Justice continues to be the model the school adopts when resolving pastoral matters. It is a way of viewing conflict and wrongdoing that focuses first on the harm these cause to relationships, and the obligation to repair that harm. The practice of Restorative Justice does not in any way excuse the wrongdoing or minimise the responsibility of the need to put things right; more so there is an emphasis on maintaining high standards of conduct. Therefore, the high expectation of students' conduct and the consistent application of restorative practices at our college sets the moral benchmark that expects all students to .... act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with (their) God. Micah 6:8 (NIV).

This verse, wholly applied to our lives, provides the very foundation for successful relationships, built on mutual respect and conveys the optimum setting for our students to achieve their personal best.

#### A life of "Worth"

Students at St Stephen's are



challenged to become skilled, educated, inquisitive life-long learners who have a passion for knowledge. Whilst excelling in studies is the ultimate educational aim, the development of "morally autonomous" students who have an awareness of God's presence has by far the greatest impact on the life of our students, preparing them for a "life of worth not just a life of work".

#### **Student Leadership**

With the start of a new year comes the excitement of servant leadership. It is of great importance that our student leaders in 2018 operate in a Servant Leadership mode. The job description for Leadership may not read as expected. The focus for our student leaders is:

## FROM THE MIDDLE LEADER - SCIENCE

#### Stepping up STEM at St Stephen's Catholic College

The new school year started early for myself and for two of our year twelve students. I was fortunate enough to be selected to attend the STEM X Academy in Canberra in the week before the student free days. STEM X is a professional learning experience for teachers of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), held over five days at the Australian National University. I was one of only 70 teachers chosen from almost 400 applications to attend STEM X, and my fees were fully paid by the sponsorship of Engineers Australia.





STEM X is organised by the Australian Science Teachers Association, in partnership with the CSIRO and Questacon. We participated in activities designed to improve our skills in and confidence to design, develop and implement our own STEM activities and resources back at school. The entire week was jammed packed with presentations from scientists, learning to create and use a Makerspace, working with a research scientist to develop problem solving strategies and visiting some of the best science facilities our country has to offer – Geoscience Australia, the Mt Stromlo Observatory and the ARC Centre of Excellence for Translational Photosynthesis, to name but a few of those we visited. The highlight of the week was being one of only twelve people given a personal tour of the Electo Optic Systems laser telescope at Mt Stromlo by the CEO, Dr Ben Greene. His company has developed innovative solutions in the tracking, monitoring and management of space debris, and these solutions are used globally.

STEM X was the most rewarding professional learning activity I have attended, and I would like to thank my sponsors Engineers Australia for giving me this opportunity. I am looking forward to working collaboratively with other STEM teachers at our college to help ignite the STEM spark in our students!

#### **Our NYSF Experience**

In 2017, we were both fortunate enough to be selected by Rotary to attend the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) in January 2018. The NYSF is a twelve day program in Canberra held at the Australian National University (ANU), where we were able to live on campus and completely immerse ourselves in STEM laboratory visits, lectures from renowned scientists, learning about year twelve and university life, and tours around the campus facilities.

**Dylan's Story:** I expected to arrive at the Australian National University to a scene of 200 incredibly bright students and go with them to some lectures about 'science' things, see some fancy laboratories and maybe even come to a decision about what I want to do when I leave school. My expectations were completely thrown out the window when I got to the NYSF. We were all given name tags called wouches; a pouch with a wow factor they told us. This was a life saver because

learning 200 people's names is quite the challenge. It also made starting a conversation and making lots of new friends easier. I should probably add a disclaimer here because we, the NYSF Alumni, were sworn to secrecy to preserve the experience of future NYSFers, so I cannot give you the finer details. Instead, I will tell you about my favourite part of my experience. Although I was placed in a physics interest group, every student got to see the Australian War Memorial.

This visit spoke to me the most, not just because of the fantastic advancement in warfare technology tour we received, but because of the vast array of primary sources on display. It was just so fascinating to see all the artefacts and read the stories of men and women who have died for Australia since the early 1900's.

The experience was incredibly hard to describe in words. In closing, the NYSF was THE MOST amazing, fantastic, inspiring experience of my life and it has left me with plenty to think about this year. If you have an interest in Science, Technology, Engineering or Maths (STEM) and are in year eleven this year, I would strongly encourage you to apply to the NYSF because you will not regret attending.



**Keeley's story:** I was selected to be in the Ecology, Sustainability, and Environmental group with fourteen other STEM enthusiasts. One of my favourite laboratory visits, without giving too much away, was travelling to Canowindra to dig for trilobite fossils and learning what it takes to become a palaeontologist. The session was led by Alex Ritchie, who discovered the Gooloogongia loomesi fish fossils, believed to be 360-370 million years old. We also learnt the importance of vegetation on livestock sites and what are the biggest impacts to the erosion of soils.



I was also able to visit other areas of the university and interest groups through the STEM+ laboratory visits. Some of the things I learnt included the physics behind dancing; the "coldest Place" where Bose–Einstein condensate is made; and a lab tour around the quantum physics lab. Listening to so many humble scientists who are passionate about their work and research was truly inspiring. There was never a moment of relaxation as we were constantly kept on our toes by mind-boggling

riddles or chants that the whole of Canberra could hear. Applying for NYSF was one of the most amazing things I have ever done and I'm so thankful for the experience as it has opened up an entire new world.

We both have gained so much from this experience like improving our public speaking skills, social skills, networking and the motivation to complete the tough year that is ahead of us. NYSF was truly life changing and we thank everyone who has helped us achieve this.

#### Welcome to the library for 2018

Our first big promotion in the library will embrace Library Lovers Day (Wednesday 14 February) and encourage students to choose a blind date with a book. This is a chance for students to borrow a book they might not have chosen themselves from the shelves. St Stephen's library is well stocked and the librarians more than ready to recommend great books to read.

Existing research shows that school libraries can have a positive impact on student achievement, student satisfaction and learning in general. There is evidence to show that a strong library program can lead to higher student achievement and a print-rich environment leads to more reading, and free voluntary reading is the best predictor of comprehension, vocabulary growth, spelling and grammatical ability and writing style. Please encourage your students to borrow from their library and maybe read a book together.

Textbooks have been distributed to all students. Please be mindful that all textbooks must be returned at the end of the year, in a reasonable condition. Students must return the books borrowed in their name. Any book that is not returned will need to be paid for, so that replacement copies can be purchased for the following year. As the school Guidance Counsellor, I am at school every day. This is my fourth year at St Stephen's Catholic College and I love my job.

This year, I have a new office in M Block beside the Pastoral Leaders. The services that counsellors are able to provide for students and families in Catholic schools include such matters as:

- Providing information sessions for classes on current topics such as bullying issues, healthy relationships, goal setting and organization, selfesteem and resilience.
- Working with small groups on issues such as anger management, self-confidence, resilience and assertiveness, grief and loss, positive thinking and stress issues.
- Discussions with parents and staff regarding concerns about student performance, behaviour or emotional well-being.
- Counselling sessions for matters relating to a broad range of issues such as, family dynamics, friendship

concerns, poor self-esteem, bullying concerns, behavioural concerns, grief and loss and general personal concerns.
