

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Friends of St Stephen's

"Culture is what people do when no one is looking."

Welcome to term two! The culture of a school plays a significant role in driving performance, which in turn, drives results. This culture permeates every aspect of school life, from the academic pursuits to the sporting triumphs, to the way students show respect to themselves and others and understand and appreciate what it means to be a student of St Stephen's.



At the commencement of term two, the running of the Inter-House Cross Country race demonstrated the positive culture of St Stephen's where students are expected to do their personal best. Congratulations to all students who participated, either as walkers earning participation points for their pastoral house, or as competitive runners. This culture was also reflected in the interim reports which I reviewed and which you should have received over the holiday break. While there are some students who struggled to devote the required effort to their studies, the majority of comments reflected a strong work ethic and corresponding positive behaviour.

An integral part of the St Stephen's culture is the embracing of the Gospel values where students treat each other with respect, acknowledging that we are all children of God whose differences should be celebrated. Unfortunately, there is a small group of students who do not appreciate this sentiment and whose behaviour affects the lives of others in a detrimental way. I am referring to bullying, whether it is a face to face confrontation or through the abuse of social media. The college has a zero tolerance on this type of behaviour and takes steps to address the matter when it is reported. I urge all students not to condone bullying by standing by and allowing it to happen to their peers. It takes courage to speak up, but this is the type of culture that we are striving to develop. Parents can also assist by monitoring their child's usage of social media at home, so that issues are not carried over to the school, thus affecting students' learning.

Service to others is another aspect of the St Stephen's culture that the college is striving to foster. I congratulate all home forms for their generosity in donating funds to Caritas, the social justice arm of the Catholic Church. This service is not restricted to fund raising—it also means giving one's time for a worthy cause or to honour those who have come before us. Not only do our College Leaders deserve to be commended for their attendance at Anzac Day commemoration services, but also those students who marched at Dimbulah, Mareeba, Atherton and other Tableland towns as representatives of St Stephen's are to be acknowledged. I also thank the Anzac Day Committee at St Stephen's for the reverent and moving service which was held at our college on 23 April.

Our college staff also reflect our culture in their approach to their vocation. Schools are dynamic places where no one day is the same. On occasion, there are staff changes due to sickness, leave or other emergencies. One of our senior teachers, Mrs Sue Donovan, has taken medical leave for term two and we wish her a speedy recovery. For family reasons, Mr Greg Thorpe is relocating to a school closer to his place of residence and will finish his time with St Stephens's on 26 April. He will be replaced by Mrs Shelley Hunt, a very experienced teacher who has spent several years teaching at international schools overseas. I thank Mr Thorpe for his contribution to our college in term one. At all times, we have the well-being of students as our moral imperative, so changes to classes and timetables are carried out with much thought.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Welcome back to term two. I hope that all families had a happy and safe Easter and were able to spend time with family over this special period. For students, this term is eleven weeks in duration and involves block exams for our seniors, commencing in week nine. It is important that students start the term well and reflect on their results from term one. Equally, it is important for students to set their goals early for term two and ask for feedback from their teachers so that strategies and processes can be implemented early to improve achievement levels.



Asking for targeted and specific feedback is important for the learning process to continue for students. Teachers are best placed to answer questions for students and identify areas that require improvement; however it is also the responsibility of the student to ask teachers what can be done better in the future, in order to achieve well in a particular subject or area of need. One significant part of feedback is the completion of drafts when working on assessment. A new drafting process has been established starting this term, where drafts will be made mandatory for all subjects across year seven to twelve. Teachers will be expecting to see work in progress from students over the assessment time, and it is preferable that encouragement comes from not only school but also home. One aspect to remember is that drafting can come in a variety of ways and this is particularly true for subjects that are more practical in nature. If students are unsure of the expectations of a draft, they must convey this to their subject teacher so as to meet all requirements of the task.

The main message however is that we need to see work in progress from students, and that it will be difficult for students to know where they are situated in the learning process if work is not submitted for feedback. By building a strong home-school partnership, the end result will be positive outcomes for students.



In 2018, our UQ Science Ambassadors are helping to run our lunch time Science Club. For the first time, St Stephen's Catholic College has entered the UQ Sunflower Competition. Our sunflowers are nearly ready to bloom, and the head, or flower, must be harvested by 15 May.

This activity has demonstrated how different conditions can affect the growth of plants. Our competition flowers are not thriving as well as we hoped. Above all, remember that it's a three-way relationship between you, your child and the teacher to work together positively to help your child achieve their full potential.

Students have participated in the District swimming carnival, soccer and netball tournaments, and will be attending the District cross country this week. - The SRB is helpful as a communication tool.

- In the SRB, school rules, policies and procedures are included as well as tips for organisation and time management, how to manage stress, editing and study tips and goal setting.
- Parent to check and sign SRB each week.

The SRB in secondary school is one of the most important books that students need and it is vital that every child keeps all their information organised. If a student uses their SRB (diary) properly, they should be able to stay organised and have a less stressful year.



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CYBERBULLYING

Many parents and teachers are concerned about cyberbullying. It is a serious problem that can hurt young people, families and school communities. Cyberbullying is also a complex problem that is often invisible to parents and teachers. In February the Premier appointed a group of Queenslanders who are passionate about stopping cyberbullying of young people. 
