CHANGES TO PRIVACY ACT

Due to recent changes to Privacy legislation, the Diocesan Board of Governance Education has updated the privacy policy for all schools in the Cairns Diocese. The updated policy provides parents with guidance about the approved collection and use of student information. Catholic Education Services

Catholic Education Services (CES) Information Collection Notice

This collection notice supersedes the one that is printed in the Application for Enrolment Notes Booklet and is effective from 1 January 2017.

The following notice applies to all schools and colleges, and Catholic Education Services in the Diocese of Cairns.

- 1. The school collects personal information, including sensitive information about pupils and parents or guardians before and during the course of a pupil's enrolment at the school. This may be in writing or in the course of conversations. The primary purpose of collecting this information is to enable the school to provide schooling to pupils enrolled at the school, exercise its duty of care, and perform necessary associated administrative activities, which will enable pupils to take part in all the activities of the school.
- 2. Some of the information we collect is to satisfy the school's legal obligations, particularly to enable the school to discharge its duty of care.
- 3. Laws governing or relating to the operation of a school require certain information to be collected and disclosed. These include relevant Education Acts, and Public Health and Child Protection laws.
- 4. Health information about pupils is sensitive information within the terms of the Australian Privacy Principles (APPs) under the Privacy Act 1988. We may ask you to provide medical reports about pupils from time to time.
- 5. The school may disclose personal and sensitive information for educational, administrative and support purposes. This may include:
 - other schools and teachers at those schools;
 - government departments;
 - Cairns Catholic Education Services, other schools, the local diocese and parish and related church agencies and Catholic Education Commissions (Queensland and National)
 - medical practitioners;
 - people providing educational, support and health services to the School, including specialist visiting teachers, [sports] coaches, volunteers, counsellors and providers of learning and assessment tools;
 - assessment and educational authorities, including the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority;
 - people providing administrative and financial services to the school;
 - anyone you authorise the school to disclose information to; and
 - anyone to whom the school is required or authorised to disclose the information to by law, including child protection laws.
- 6. Personal information collected from pupils is regularly disclosed to their parents or guardians.
- 7. The school may use online or 'cloud' service providers to store personal information and to provide services to the school that involve the use of personal information, such as services relating to email, instant messaging and education

- and assessment applications. Some limited personal information may also be provided to these service providers to enable them to authenticate users that access their services. This personal information may reside on a cloud service provider's servers which may be situated outside Australia. Further information about the school's use of on online or 'cloud' service providers is contained in the Cairns Catholic Education Services Privacy Policy.
- 8. The Privacy Policy Statement, accessible on the school's website, sets out how parents or pupils may seek access to and correction of their personal information which the school has collected and holds. However, access may be refused in certain circumstances such as where access would have an unreasonable impact on the privacy of others, Privacy Policy and attachments where access may result in a breach of the school's duty of care to the pupil, or where pupils have provided information in confidence. Any refusal will be notified in writing with reasons if appropriate.
- 9. The Privacy Policy Statement also sets out how parents and pupils can make a complaint about a breach of the APPs and how the complaint will be handled.
- 10. The school may engage in fundraising activities. Information received from you may be used to make an appeal to you. [It may also be disclosed to organisations that assist in the school's fundraising activities solely for that purpose.] We will not disclose your personal information to third parties for their own marketing purposes without your consent.
- 11. On occasions information such as academic and sporting achievements, pupil activities and similar news is published in school newsletters and magazines, on our intranet and website. This may include photographs and videos of pupil activities such as sporting events, school camps and school excursions. The school will obtain permissions from the pupil's parent or guardian (and from the student if appropriate) if we would like to include such photographs or videos in our promotional material or otherwise make this material available to the public such as on the internet.
- 12. If you provide the school with the personal information of others, such as doctors or emergency contacts, we encourage you to inform them that you are disclosing that information to the school and why.
- 13. Catholic Education in the Diocese of Cairns is bound by the Privacy Act (1988) and has adopted the 13 Australian Privacy Principles (APPs). Our obligations are outlined in the Privacy Policy and Privacy Policy Statement which details practices and procedures for the use and management of the personal and sensitive information we collect and record. The policy and statement are available on our website http://www.cns.catholic.edu.au A printed paper copy is available on request.
- 14. As part of our obligations and duty of care. If we do not obtain the personal and sensitive information referred to above, we may not be able to enrol or continue to enrol your pupil.


I would like to take this opportunity to repeat some information given to families of years seven and ten students at the beginning of the year. Can you please help your child do the following:

I wanted to thank the students of your school for participating in the Metrogaine.


Overall it was a great day, people seemed to enjoy themselves and we raised money for a good cause. What was also pleasing was to see how polite everyone was, including the young people.

PARTICIPATION:

This event is a wonderful opportunity for students to interact with others in their pastoral house and build positive relationships and house spirit. St Stephen's Catholic College - Smart Wearables Policy

Rationale

Most Smart Wearable devices (smart watches, fitness trackers) have the capability of interacting with the owner's smartphone (either via Bluetooth radio receivers, WiFi or both). This allows the user to communicate via their wearable device as if they had their smartphone in front of them (dependent on manufacturer and model). Devices may have additional functionality to record audio and video footage, as well as interact with social media platforms. With this in mind, St Stephen's Catholic College applies the same expectations to smart wearable devices, as it does to the college's policy regarding mobile phones.

What is a smart wearable device?

A smart wearable is described as follows:

"A smart wearable device is a device that is worn on the student's person that has wireless communication with the outside world and can receive and display information via an inbuilt screen. Such devices communicate with smartphones (via Bluetooth, WiFi or some other form of wireless protocol), or communicate via the mobile network."

Policy

At St Stephen's, we are committed to students using devices to support their learning through appropriate use in school. Consequently, we believe that we have an educational responsibility to assist young people to manage the use of new technologies. The following policy has been developed to align with this belief.

Smart Wearable Policy - SSCC

- Wearable technology as defined above is not to be worn at St Stephen's Catholic College.
- Any students with wearable technology on their person are subject to the mobile device policy consequences.

Our Expectations

Parents/carers will:

- Be cognisant of our Smart Wearables policy when they enrol their child.

- Adhere to Smart Wearables Policy.
- Take responsibility for their own actions in relation to the Smart Wearables policy.
- Store their Smart Wearables in their locker as per mobile phone policy.

Staff will:

• Actively monitor student compliance with this college policy.

ST STEPHEN'S CATHOLIC COLLEGE SunSmart Policy

Rationale

Queensland has the highest rate of skin cancer in the world. Of all new cancers diagnosed in Australia each year, 80% are skin cancers. Research indicates that childhood sun exposure is an important contributing factor to the development of skin cancer later in life. Given that students are at school during peak ultraviolet radiation (UVR) times throughout the day, schools play a major role in both minimising student's UVR exposure and providing an environment where policies and procedures can positively influence student behaviour.

Skin damage, including skin cancer, is a result of cumulative exposure to the sun. Research shows that severe sunburn contributes to skin cancer and other forms of skin damage such as sunspots, blemishes and premature ageing. Most skin damage and skin cancer are therefore preventable.

UVR levels are highest during the hours that children are at school. As children will spend a portion of their day outdoors, we are committed to protecting them from harmful effects of the sun.

With this in mind, St Stephen's Catholic College realises the need to protect children's skin and educate them about SunSmart behaviour, thus reducing the risk of skin damage from exposure to the sun.

Our Commitment

St Stephen's Catholic College will:

- Inform parents of the SunSmart policy when they enrol their child
- Include the SunSmart policy statement in the school prospectus
- Incorporate education programs that focus on skin cancer prevention into the school curriculum
- Seek ongoing support from parents and the school community for the SunSmart policy and its implementation, through newsletters, parent meetings, classroom activities and other communication opportunities

Our Expectations

Parents/carers will:

- Provide the school uniform SunSmart hat for their child
- Support the school's SunSmart policy, help design and regularly update the policy

Students will:

- Be aware of the school's SunSmart policy
- Take responsibility for their own health safety by being SunSmart
- Comply with SunSmart rules and guidelines by wearing suitable hats, clothing and sunscreen where appropriate
- Apply SPF 30+ broad-spectrum (minimum rating), water-resistant sunscreen 20 minutes before going outdoors
- Use shaded or covered areas outdoors
- Act as positive role models for other students in all aspects of SunSmart behaviour
- Help design and regularly update the SunSmart policy
- Participate in SunSmart education programs

Dear students, parents, staff and College community members

From 2019, all students in Year 11 across the Cairns Diocese will undertake a new religious education program, Catholic Faith in Action, in their senior secondary years. In essence, this new program reframes and builds on the current religious education offerings. The impending changes to senior secondary curriculum and assessment necessitated a comprehensive review of the current religious education offerings in senior secondary education across the Colleges in the Diocese.

Following discussions with Bishop James Foley, a working party was formed to review religious education in Years 11 and 12 and develop a new framework for a program for these students. Bishop James challenged the working party to:

- develop a new program characterised by faith learning within the reality of young peoples' lives today;
- · provide a flexible, enriching and engaging program built on Catholic teachings; and
- create a program which calls young adults to positive action in the world, which is reflective
 of these teachings and experiences in the program.

The release of the National Catholic Education Commission's (NCEC) Religious Education in Australian Catholic Schools Framing Paper in late 2017, provided the working party with a clear point of reference to undertake this review.

The working party is a joint venture and is comprised of College Principals and Assistant Principals — Religious Education, senior staff at Cairns Catholic Education Services, Father Neil Muir - Vicar for Education and Professor Brother David Hall FMS — Dean of the La Salle Academy — Australian Catholic University (ACU).

Professor Brother David Hall was a member of the Faith Formation and Religious Education Standing Committee that consulted and prepared the NCEC Framing paper referred to above. He also facilitated and informed a workshop for the working party as part of this review. In his role at ACU, Professor Brother David Hall is well informed by the latest research regarding student engagement in religious education. Research shows that religious education programs need to be reframed in order to be more meaningful for young adults.

2019 RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM

The Catholic Faith in Action program to be implemented from 2019 is an integrated program. The elements of its framework include Year 12 Graduate Expectations, Guiding Principles, Components and Accountabilities. The components of this new program will include scripture, Catholic social teaching, Catholic worldview, other religious experiences, worldviews and Indigenous spirituality, Catholic anthropology, ethics and morality, religious identity and culture, evangelisation and faith formation, prayer and worship, social justice and action.

An important feature of the *Catholic Faith in Action* program is the level of flexibility for the integration of its key components, which will be more responsive and reflective of the needs of students within the local context of each College. This allows for an expression of faith learning which reflects the local traditions and charisms of each individual College.

This new program of religious education in Years 11 and 12 is compulsory at each College in the Diocese but does not contribute to a student's Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and/or Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). Accountability measures will be in place to ensure meaningful participation and achievement of the Year 12 Graduate Expectations. Colleges will still offer elective courses of study in religion, such as Study of Religion, Religion and Ethics and Certificate III/IV in Christian Ministry and Theology, which will contribute to a student's QCE and ATAR.

Each College will communicate to students and parents how the Catholic Faith in Action program will be delivered.

We are confident that this new expression of religious education in the final years of secondary education will enhance student capacity to make meaning in religious education and relate it to their own life.




