FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Friends of St Stephen's

"Honesty and transparency make you vulnerable. Be honest and transparent anyway."

(Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta)

Each year the election of year twelve leaders is met with great anticipation, a sense of excitement and some apprehension. The process is very transparent to students and staff, but



not always known to parents. Therefore, a segment of this newsletter article will be devoted to explaining the process. On 17 September, all year eleven students will participate in a leadership day, the purpose of which is to develop each student's awareness of what it means to be a leader in a Catholic school. An external presenter from Project Hatch will engage the students in a variety of activities which relate to the theme of how they influence others, the role which God plays in their lives and their strengths as leaders. All students, whether the recipients of a formal title or not, are leaders and this program seeks to affirm their positive qualities and assist them to work as a cohesive group.

The role of each leadership position is explained both by the College Principal and by the current year 12 leaders who can provide insights into the rewards and challenges of being a leader. Students have approximately three weeks to complete their nominations for more than one position. Nominations are reviewed and short-listing occurs for College Captains based on the quality of the nomination and the endorsement by teachers chosen by the applicant. These students are then asked to present a two-minute speech at the forthcoming whole school assembly, after which year ten, year eleven students and staff cast their votes in a secret ballot system, based on preferential voting with scrutineers. All votes are of equal weight. The top six students are short-listed and undergo an interview process conducted by members of the senior leadership team and the College Board. After this process, four students are chosen as College Captains for 2019.

To provide every opportunity for leadership, unsuccessful candidates are encouraged to nominate for other leadership positions as Pastoral House Leaders, the Student Representative Council Executive and the Social Justice Committee. All of these positions are also subject to preferential voting and scrutineers. The process takes more than a week to execute, after which an official announcement of the 2019 leaders is made at a whole school assembly. It is always amazing to witness the high standard of potential leaders' presentations to their peers and the confidence they demonstrate. Throughout this entire process, the student voice is respected as the deciding factor in who is elected.

Another issue in which it is important to be honest and transparent is student attendance at St Stephen's. With the assistance of the Business Intelligence tool since 2015, reliable data about attendance is quickly generated. Unfortunately, this is an area which requires significant improvement, as our attendance rate is currently 91.7%---below the Diocesan average and our key performance indicator of 95%. While many students are to be commended for achieving 100% attendance, a significant number are constantly absent for reasons other than genuine illness. It is not possible to achieve one's potential by missing school on a regular basis. I urge parents to ensure that their children attend school each day, unless there are extenuating circumstances preventing this from occurring. Students have approximately fourteen weeks of holiday each year which should be sufficient for family trips.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

All students must attend school until they complete year ten or turn sixteen, whichever comes first. Post compulsory schooling occurs in years eleven and twelve when students choose to be at school to achieve certification. This cannot occur if they are absent on a regular basis, as failure to attend school impacts on their ability to achieve a Queensland Certificate of Education and also erodes the integrity of the system. St Stephen's is very accommodating to those students who wish to pursue a vocational pathway by taking up school-based traineeships and apprenticeships or TAFE courses. However, this offer needs to be respected and it is within the rights of the school to cancel enrolment in the vocational course if attendance is not regular. Another contributing factor to absenteeism with senior students is part-time work, which, if more than ten hours per week, can detrimentally impact on their results, especially if students are too tired to attend school.

On a more positive note, congratulations are extended to three sets of students. On Thursday 23 August, the premier St Stephen's Chess Team came first which means that students will now compete at the state level in Brisbane. Similarly, three students from years seven and eight blitzed the Mathematics Quiz in Cairns and are also off to the state titles in Brisbane in October. Not to be outdone, the year seven Opti-MINDS team have been invited to participate at state level. I would like to thank our teachers who devote time outside of their teaching load to mentor these students.

I welcome feedback about the issues I have raised in this newsletter article, especially the process for the election of leaders and the concerning level of absenteeism among some students. Your input as parents is greatly valued, as we continually strive to improve our processes.

They participated in a mix of theory and practical sessions: learning about driver safety; the effect of drugs and alcohol on their ability to drive, walk and complete basic tasks; they chatted to officers from the Queensland Police Service; and students even examined an unroadworthy car, so they know what to look for when purchasing their first vehicle. The year eleven students were fantastic ambassadors of our college, and I am proud of their behaviour and contribution on the day.



The next significant milestone for our year eleven students is the leadership process they are about to undertake. Term three is seeing the Technology department keeping busy.

With the recent purchase of a laser cutter, the INTAD (Industrial Technology and Design) team has started to revolutionise the design aspects of our course. Semester one saw the introduction of the acoustic speaker into year nine ITD, coasters into year ten Graphics, laser etching onto dartboards in our Certificate II in Furniture Making and also crash test cars into our Engineering Technology subjects.



The ICT (Information and Communication Technology) team have not missed out. With the recent refurbishment of M and T room, we now have a state of the art learning space. This space incorporates cubes for seating, cloud shaped whiteboards for tables and a dedicated area for our robotic work.

I am very proud of the lunch-time sessions that are run by our department in both the Robotics and the INTAD/ Graphics areas. Students have embraced these sessions, showing up week after week, with some even entering external competitions to show off their skills. Some of our robotics club members travelled to Cairns for the "She Flies" drone day, where they learnt to program and fly drones to complete different activities, including shooting items into a bucket and mapping an unseen area on autopilot.

After our success over the last three years in the Business Liaison Association's competitions, we are working very hard this year to ensure our entrants for 2018 have just as much success. These competitions focus on design skills, graphical work as well as production skills.
