Welcome to the 2019 school year. The above quote from scripture reminds us of the importance of working together as a community—teachers, non-teaching staff, students and parents—in order to foster the well-being of our students. Each part is important to the success of our college from an academic, pastoral and spiritual viewpoint.

Among the tenets of the St Stephen's culture which our community promotes, are the sense of family and a strong focus on respect, responsibility and confidence in a faith-based environment. On 29 January, our college welcomed the newest members of the St Stephen's family—103 year seven students. I am very grateful to the year seven Pastoral Leader, Mrs Salerno, and the home form teachers for the caring manner in which they supported these students in the transition from primary to secondary school.

Continuing the legacy of academic excellence set by past cohorts, the seniors of 2018 achieved outstanding results. Not only did 99% of students achieve a Queensland Certificate of Education, but 29% of OP-eligible students gained between a 1 and 5, with Ellana Spena and Elena Pilat as the OP 1 recipients. In the majority of cases, our students received their first preference of tertiary studies. The college community is very proud of the efforts of all year twelve students and wishes them the very best with their future studies or the world of work.

In keeping with the demands of the 21st century with its focus on digital learning, two more cohorts have received digital devices. In 2019, the year nine students will be the only cohort to access the computers via the trolley booking system. Along with access to the management learning system, Canvas, it is our hope that all students will benefit from this initiative.

During the summer break, major projects were completed. To provide shelter from both the sun and rain, a covered walkway now connects the college to the bus shelter on McIver Road. Refurbishment of one of the computer laboratories as a flexible learning area will also enable teachers and students to experience 21st century pedagogy.

Teachers have the greatest impact on a student's learning. We are pleased to welcome four (4) new Middle Leaders, a Guidance Counsellor and three non-teaching staff to St Stephen's in 2019. (Refer to the relevant section in the newsletter for information about our new staff.) On 18 February, there will be a "Meet and Greet" evening for parents and carers of year seven students. This is an informal event where parents can meet their child's teachers, as well as other parents. We are grateful to the Parents and Friends Association for hosting a BBQ on this occasion.

The 21st century is best described as an era of change and education is no exception. In 2020, the current year eleven students will be the first to graduate under the new Queensland Certificate of Education system which is significantly different from the system which applies to our current year twelve students.



FROM THE PRINCIPAL

To inform parents and carers of these changes, there will be a year eleven information evening on Monday 11 February. Key members of the senior and middle leadership teams will be in attendance to assist parents to understand the new system. Parents of year eleven students have received a letter about this evening and I strongly encourage everyone to attend.

While teaching and learning is the core business of the college, we are mindful of developing whole people who are compassionate, kind, emphatic, grateful and resilient, while seeing the face of Jesus in all those with whom they come into contact. At assemblies, students are urged to adopt the PRIDE philosophy by demonstrating perseverance, respect, integrity, dignity and excellence in their interactions with the members of our St Stephen's community and beyond.

The success of any school is reliant on the positive relationships that are formed between teachers, students and their families. I value the feedback that parents provide to improve our practices and the opportunities for students. Their well-being is at the focus of all that we do. I thank you all sincerely for sending your students to school for the start of the year with all the necessary materials and invite you to be active participants in our college through the Parents and Friends Association which meets once a term.

We have had a great start to the school year and I look forward to working with you all in 2019.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Welcome back to 2019! I trust that all members of the school community were able to celebrate the holidays in a relaxing and joyous manner.

This year brings a number of new challenges for our new students in a variety of areas. The major change in 2019 is the introduction of the new Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) system. This will see year eleven students undertake external exams for general subjects in late 2020, a process not seen for over forty (40) years in this state.



There have also been changes to the way the QCE is calculated for the year eleven students. All of these changes will be outlined, along with other supporting resources the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) has developed, through a parent information night which will be held on Monday 11 February. I would encourage all parents, carers and students to attend this information session on the new system. I can guarantee that from a school perspective, teachers have been preparing over the last eighteen (18) months for the transition to the new senior system.

This year is also special as we will be running a dual system of the new Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) processes in year eleven and the superseded Overall Position (OP) system in year twelve. Parents of year twelve students should feel assured that the college will make sure that the outcomes of all year twelve students are made a priority. This includes the QCS preparation program, QCE outcomes and quality assured assessment techniques. Throughout the year, the college will communicate with students and parents about certain dates of importance (ie: QCS dates and exam block dates) and your support of these processes would be appreciated. From time to time, parent interviews regarding the progress of year twelve students may be required to make sure your son or daughter is on the correct pathway.

To allow for the transition to the new QCE system, a redevelopment of the timetable has occurred. This has meant that senior students are able to have more contact time per week with their teachers, which should improve student outcomes. Monday now commences at 8.45 am, with Tuesday to Friday commencing at 8.30 am. Each day will finish at 3.00 pm, with days consisting of six (6) by fifty (50) minute lessons. Although the college has redeveloped the timetable to maximise student outcomes, the major contributing factor to student achievement is attendance. Attending every day across each term and participating in lessons and meeting assessment expectations will allow your students to reach their highest potential. The partnership between the home and the school cannot be underestimated and when these two stakeholders are working in unison, achievement levels increase.

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

It is with much excitement and great enthusiasm that we join forces in the role of Assistant Principal Religious Education at St Stephen's this year. We look forward to taking a team approach to leading the faith-life of our college.

Last week, over 600,000 young Catholics joined with Pope Francis to celebrate the World Youth Day Closing Mass in Panama. The Pope's concluding message to young pilgrims from all over the world is particularly relevant for us as we begin a new school year and can be summarised in one word: **"NOW"**. Pope



Francis described the danger of living in "a kind of waiting room, sitting around until we are called." He stated that often both adults and young people think that their "Now has not yet come," or that they are "too young to be involved in dreaming about and working for the future." Pope Francis encouraged "dreaming of and working for tomorrow, starting today." He urged young people to realize that they have a mission and to become passionate about it, stating, "We may possess everything, but if we lack the passion of love, we will have nothing." Pope Francis' words provide great inspiration for our college community, encouraging us to make the very best use of our time and talents, to be active learners, agents of change and to live our lives with passion and intention in service of others. We are blessed to be part of the community of St Stephen's and must embrace the learning and service opportunities at our college.

Catholic Faith in Action

Last week, year eleven students commenced the Catholic Faith in Action Program, a faith learning experience which captures the sentiments of Pope Francis at World Youth Day, by calling students to examine faith within the reality of their own life and take positive action which is reflective of Catholic Social Teaching. Student Welfare

Welcome back to all our parents and students. I am looking forward to continuing strong partnerships with parents and students this year, building on 2018. As College Leader Pastoral Care, welfare of students is core to my role. In attending to the welfare of students it is important that any issues are dealt with in a timely, respectful and supportive manner. It is with this in mind that the process of attending to issues is clearly outlined. Any issue of a minor nature that is class related is to first be brought to the attention of the class teacher, who is best positioned to provide a timely response. If a matter is persistent or of a more significant nature, then the college has in place the position of Middle Leaders Pastoral (MLP) who will attend to such matters in relation to their year cohorts. Parents wishing to contact or make an appointment with an MLP, can do so via our school office or emailing the MLP directly. Contact details can be directly accessed through the school's website.

If a matter is unresolved, persistent or of a serious nature, then I will be directly involved to ensure the matter is attended to swiftly and respectfully.

New Initiative - Buddy Program

Our senior and year seven students have been buddied this term to foster pastoral care and pastoral house spirit. The intent of the program is that there would be opportunities created to allow our senior students to "catch up" and assist our junior students with any questions or practical help they may want in settling in to life St Stephen's. The initiative is designed to have a dual effect, whereby establishing a "buddy" friendship that may continue throughout the year. Scheduled opportunities for meetings will occur in term one.

New Initiative - Transition Card

Many thanks to Mrs Jayarani Salerno and assisting staff for the creation of a transition card. The transition card lists important contacts for 2019 to assist year seven students transition to college life.

Restorative Justice

Restorative justice continues to be the model the school adopts when resolving pastoral matters. It is a way of viewing conflict and wrongdoing that focuses

first on the harm these cause to relationships, and the obligation to repair that harm. The practice of restorative justice does not in any way excuse the wrongdoing or minimise the responsibility of the need to put things right; more so there is an emphasis on maintaining



high standards of conduct. Therefore, the high expectation of students' conduct and the consistent application of restorative practices at our college sets the moral benchmark that expects all students to act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with (their) God. Micah 6:8 (NIV). This verse, wholly applied to our lives, provides the very foundation for successful relationships, built on mutual respect and conveys the optimum setting for our students to achieve their personal best.

Student Leadership

With the start of a new year comes the excitement of servant leadership. It is of great importance that our student leaders in 2019 operate in a servant leadership mode. The job description for leadership may not read as expected. The focus for our student leaders is:

- It is not about profit, gain or glory.
- It is about relationship, service and humility.
- It stems from being faithful to who you are.
- It means following the example of Jesus.

FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

Welcome back to all families for the 2019 school year.

Diocesan policy is for school fees to be sent out during week two of each term. Although we try our best to be 100% accurate, sometimes errors can appear in the first run of school fees for the year. Items that can be inadvertently missed are sibling discounts and bus charges. If you have another child attending a Catholic School in the Diocese, you are entitled to a 15% discount off your tuition fees. If there are two younger siblings at a Catholic school then the discount increases to 30% off tuition fees. Therefore, it is important that the office is informed of any sibling information.



Families that travel on the Dimbulah, Kuranda, Mossman, Atherton and Tolga buses are charged a \$20.00 per week bus fare via their school fees. Therefore, we need to know the occupants of each bus.

In 2011, the College Board approved a 5% discount off total fees for families who pay their entire fees upfront at the beginning of the year. This offer will be available again in 2019.

While I am new to this position, I have now spent an entire decade working at St Stephen's in the roles of teacher, Vocational Education Coordinator and Careers Advisor. After having completed my Masters of Guidance and Counselling in 2018, I am keen to implement my new skills and assist students to improve their emotional, social and mental well-being. All students have the opportunity to meet with me as needed, can self-refer or can be referred by parents and teachers. Students can come to my office or email me for an appointment. I can assist students with developing their organisation and time management skills, improving study skills, negotiating/improving friendships, developing/ improving relationships with family members and teachers, managing



stress and anxiety, improving grades and goal setting etc. I will also be case managing students with social and emotional needs through Student Diversity. I look forward to assisting as many students as I can this year to develop their skills and resilience and to building relationships with parents and the wider community. Tips for Helping your Child Overcome Back-to-School Anxiety (Retrieved from <u>https://www.kidspot.com.au</u>)

Share your own personal school experiences.

As a parent, it's beneficial to share your own school experiences; the activities you enjoyed, what you learnt, anything you felt anxious about and overcame, and subjects you may have struggled with. Children typically enjoy hearing stories from their parent's childhood as it helps normalise the anxiety they may be feeling and offers them reassurance.

Role play

Role play can really help in dealing with anxiety inducing situations and assist children in feeling confident about coping with them when they arise. For example, have your child act out the part a student who isn't understanding class work and help them model appropriate responses and coping techniques. This will help them relate these into real-life situations.

Prepare and familiarise

Plan how you can help reduce the amount of unexpected and uncontrollable situations your child will face. Think of everything you can do in advance of their first weeks to help your child feel in control of their experience. Walk or drive your child on the route to their new school, so they get used to what the trip will look like and think about arranging for friends to meet them at the school gate when they arrive. Research shows that the presence of a familiar peer during school transitions can improve children's academic and emotional adjustment. Every little bit of preparation helps relieve their anxiety of getting settled into a new school year.

FROM THE MIDDLE LEADER STUDENT DIVERSITY

It is an honour and privilege to have the position of Middle Leader Student Diversity at St Stephen's Catholic College. My name is Trudy Pretorius and I look forward to learning alongside all staff, students and parents associated with the college.

My experience as an educator comes close to reaching the twenty (20) year mark and has provided me opportunities to work in small, rural schools as well as large, metropolitan establishments: from Dimbulah to London, to the car park of a convenience store in a little town in South Africa - a most rewarding experience, helping young children learn to read with



scratchings in the dirt, as they waited for their parents to collect them after opportunistic work was attained on a day-by-day basis.

The rewards of educating are far reaching and rarely predictable: flexibility and change are keystones in education. I appreciate and embrace both, if the purpose is valid, with the best interest of learners at heart.

Having completed a Master of Education in an area considered Information Science (that of Teacher Librarianship), my role has seen me work with students from all of the Catholic feeder schools on the Tablelands. 

DEBORAH HERMANUS - YEAR TWELVE



National Youth Science Forum

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF), or as the alumni fondly remember, 'nerd camp', is a twelve (12) day residential program purposed to expose senior year students to the many careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). This year, 588 students from across Australia, with a minority being international students, were selected from 1,300 applications. These students were allocated to one of three sessions occurring beginning, middle and end of January. I attended the last session, Session C, of the NYSF this year through the financial support of Mareeba Rotary, the selection process conducted by Rotary District 9550, and the encouragement of St Stephen's Catholic College, my family and friends.

This year, Session C was held at the Australian National University (ANU), giving students of the NYSF the opportunity to visit Canberra's many STEM facilities. These STEM visits were tailored to the interests of students, and as my interest was engineering, I was able to explore and conduct sample experiments related to the ongoing research in places such as the Deep Space Communication Centre and the ANU Research School of Engineering and Physics. Participants also attended several lectures delivered by renowned Australian scientists, and listened to Dr. Alan Finkel AO, the Chief Scientist of Australia, outline his academic journey to his current position. Each of the NYSF's major partners, among which included several universities, then presented students with a better insight into the STEM opportunities they offered post-graduation. Between visits and lectures, participants engaged in many social events, which facilitated much networking between the cohort, visiting alumni, and several Australian scientists. This fostered a strong sense of community, and made farewells all the more difficult.

As one of three students selected to attend the NYSF from Rotary District 9550, the prestige of this opportunity was overwhelming. All who attended had completed the same (if not more) rigorous selection process that I had, so from the first day, it was obvious that I was surrounded by Australia's future scientists. In an atmosphere so welcoming, it was hard to not settle in quickly. Every day was packed with activities, leaving myself with an abundance of STEM knowledge to process each evening. I was constantly encouraged to leave my comfort zone, and when given time to reflect on the program's last day, I came to realise the amount of personal growth I had achieved over a mere twelve days. Not only did every participant feel more equipped for their senior year, but the NYSF had initiated excitement within us for our journey ahead.

In a stereotypical school setting, there is much stigma surrounding terms such as 'nerd camp' and 'STEM'. When attending programs such as the NYSF, this stigma is debunked. With a network of over 10,000 alumni from the last 36 years that the NYSF has been running, attending this program has given myself the opportunity to form important connections within the Australian STEM community. Through these connections, I have discovered several career pathways I had not known existed. Between the 189 students, 23 staff members, and twelve (12) days of my session, I am incredibly grateful for all who made this experience possible. For those in year eleven with even the slightest interest in STEM, I would highly recommend applying for the NYSF, because there is nothing to lose from extending yourself.

ALANNAH FALVO - YEAR NINE

During the summer holidays, I travelled to Canberra to participate in the 2019 National Questacon Invention Convention. At the end of last year, I was selected as one (1) of twenty-five (25) students from across Australia to participate in this five (5) day workshop at the Ian Potter Foundation Technology Learning Centre.

Over the course of the five (5) days, I was given the chance to create a prototype of an invention which incorporated the theme of 'Liveable Communities'. This theme was all about exploring issues in our local areas and trying to prevent these problems into the future. My invention was a sediment collector and was aimed at reducing sediment-runoff in the Great Barrier Reef. It was intended to not only help the Great Barrier Reef, but also the farmers who had lost their sediment due to flooding, by returning the collected sediment back to farmers to be reused. Using robotics, computer-aided design (CAD), 3D printing, workshop machinery and tools, as well as other materials, I was able to bring my idea to life along with the support and inspiration I received from various STEM professionals.

I had an incredible experience and met amazing people with similar interests as myself. Some of the highlights of my trip were meeting Australian entrepreneurs and getting advice on how to improve my invention, as well as tips on how to become a successful entrepreneur. I was also interviewed and featured on the local WIN news. But the biggest highlight of all, was the end of week showcase where my fellow delegates and I presented our final prototypes to many guests such as Australian innovators, scientists, entrepreneurs, past delegates and most importantly his Excellency the Governor General, Sir Peter Cosgrove.

Overall, I gained so much from this experience, such as improved networking, public speaking and coding skills, as well as inspiration to never give up on an idea, no matter how many times you may fail. I am truly grateful for this opportunity and would recommend applying to anyone who is interested in STEM. "

In 2018, the Peninsula School Sport Board undertook a review into the structures and operations of District School Sport within the FNQ region. The findings from this review have provided the opportunity for Peninsula School Sport to work together with District Sporting Committees to improve outcomes for students and staff. Future key improvements to District School Sport in FNQ include:

*Re-aligning and amalgamation of new 10 to 19 years sporting Districts.

*Streamlining student pathways into District Sporting teams.

*Developing processes and strategies for schools to utilise in the transition of students from primary into high school to enhance participation in sporting programs.

*Ensuring mandatory Department of Education Guidelines and risk management procedures are implemented and followed.

*Enhancing involvement, decision making and communication from leading FNQ school leaders, staff and Pensport.

*Re-invigorating school sport competitions and programs – schools have the opportunity to review, reflect and enhance their own sporting programs within District Clusters to maximise student participation.
