Automation and the workplace of the future

Research last year from the Mckinsey Global Institute, identified automation and artificial intelligence (AI) as key drivers in changing the nature of work. It also identified a number of trends that would be key in shaping the future digital workplace. Among them are the following and click here to read more:

- 1. Automation will accelerate the shift in required workforce skills, technological skills will be in highest demand.
- 2. Some skill categories will be less in demand. As tasks change, jobs will need to be redefined and companies say they will need to become more agile. Independent work will likely grow.
- 3. Competition for high-skill workers will increase, while displacement will be concentrated mainly on low-skill workers.
- 4. Companies will need to make significant organizational changes at the same time as addressing these skill shifts to stay competitive.
- Almost half of the companies surveyed say they expect to take the lead in building the workforce of the future. These companies expect to offer the most attractive workplace for the most skilled digital workers.

Have you thought of a - Lagger, pathology collector or project manager

Laggers apply insulating materials, such as felt, fibreglass, polyurethane and cork, to pipes, steam generators, process vats and ducting, and secure insulation with wire, wire netting, staples, metal strapping and using welding torches.

Pathology Collectors extract, collect, label and preserve blood and other specimens from patients for laboratory analysis.

GU: Griffith University scholarships

Over 700 scholarships are available to cover tuition fees, accommodation, learning materials, travel costs and living expenses for high achieving students, rural and regional students, and students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Low Income Health Care Card

You may be eligible for this card if **your** income is below the income test set for an individual. If your average weekly income is below \$561.00 you may be eligible. More info at Human Services website.

QUT scholarship update

QUT Excellence Scholarships (formerly Vice-Chancellor's Scholarships), are scholarships for school leavers with outstanding academic achievement or creative performance. The scholarships, valued at \$10,000 to \$30,000, are highly competitive and are awarded to the top ranked students who have indicated QUT as their first QTAC preference.

To be eligible for the academic scholarships, students must receive an OP 1–2 or equivalent. Students who think they may receive an OP 1–5 are encouraged to apply. All students who participate in an audition or portfolio process for specified creative industries courses are automatically considered for the creative industries and elite visual and performing arts scholarships. Students receive financial support as well as other opportunities through the scholarship program.

Applications for Excellence Scholarships are open from 1 August 2019 and close on 15 November 2019.

TAFE: Queensland Scholarships for Semester I 2020

There are two types of scholarships available. Each scholarship is valued at \$5,000. Applications for these scholarships for Semester 1 2020 are now open and will close on 29 August 2019. Visit the <u>website</u> for details. These are:



- Cost of accommodation and when to apply
- Travel costs
- Support for interstate students
- Scholarships and other financial support programs and schemes
- Application process (do you use a tertiary admissions centre or apply directly?)
- Application due dates
- Overseas exchange programs
- Employment programs (e.g. traineeships, work experience).

Mater Education: Certificate III and Diploma courses

Mater Education is located in Brisbane and offers the following certificate courses in addition to its <u>D</u> <u>Nursing</u> and <u>D Anaesthetic Technology</u>:

- <u>Certificate III Allied Health Assistance</u> This course trains students to work in assistant roles in areas such as physiotherapy, occupational therapy, podiatry, social work and speech pathology.
- <u>Certificate III in Health Services Assistance</u> This course prepares students for work in roles such as assistant in nursing, patient care attendant, personal carer, orderly and wards person.
- <u>Certificate III in Pathology Collection</u> This course trains students with the technical expertise to work as a member of a pathology laboratory team (phlebotomy).

• <u>Certificate III in Individual Support</u> – this course gives students the opportunity to gain skills and knowledge needed to work within the community or residential care setting.

There are generally two intakes per year into these courses. Each course includes a two-week vocational placement. Certificate III guarantee is available for eligible students. Employment outcomes on graduation are good. These courses could be used as taster courses for students unsure of their interest in health occupations.

Fixed closing dates

- 20 September 2019 Registration with QUT for Creative Industry courses with additional entry requirements (ie. Fashion, Design, Fine Arts Visual Arts).

Note that if you don't meet the due dates, you will not be considered for the course.

How are applicants selected for courses through QTAC?

For 2019 entry to many of the courses you can apply for through QTAC are competitive. Consequently, many institutions use specific selection criteria to select students. Once institution admission rules are met (i.e. English Language Proficiency – automatic for most domestic students; age requirements – generally 18 years or completion of Year 12) selection is based on:

- meeting minimum entry requirements for the course (these may include subject prerequisites (usually Authority subjects), a folio; an interview or audition; a specific test, an essay or questionnaire; the successful completion of a course), and
- merit (OPs and FPs or a QTAC Selection Rank).

Through the QTAC process, eligible applicants (i.e. those who meet the entry requirements) are considered in order of merit (i.e. OP or QTAC Selection Rank). In very simplistic terms, the OP or Rank of the last person to get into the course before all places are filled becomes the lowest OP/Rank to receive an offer or minimum selection threshold, for that course in that offer round. From 2020 QTAC will use a student's ATAR to rate their competitiveness for entry into a specific course.

How will I know I have an offer?

You get only one offer per offer round. This is for your highest eligible preference (i.e. the highest course on your preference list where you have met the minimum entry requirements and your OP/Rank is above the lowest OP/Rank to receive an offer. If you get an offer, QTAC will send you an email or SMS notifying you to log in to your QTAC application account to view, print and respond to your offer.

Year 12 students could receive an offer anytime from 15 November 2019 (not including early offers through some university programs). It is essential that you monitor your emails and mobile phone (for an SMS) from 15 November until you firmly accept an offer. If you receive an offer, you have four days to respond to it. If you don't respond by the due date, the offer will lapse and you will no longer be considered for any other course. If this happens, contact QTAC immediately. Remember to use your private email address NOT your school email address on your QTAC application.

QTAC prepaid application vouchers

If you are having difficulty paying for your QTAC application or you can only pay for your QTAC application with cash you should see your guidance officer/counsellor to request a prepayment voucher.

Scaling of ATAR subjects - updated link

In the last bulletin an article about scaling of ATAR subjects was included in the QTAC section. Some readers were not able to open the link and we apologise for any inconvenience. You can follow these steps to read the article on scaling of ATAR subjects:

- 1. Visit the QTAC website
- 2. Hover on the ATAR and MY Path tab on the top navigation bar click on the ATAR tab
- 3. Scroll down to the four red links and click on the Read a white paper about inter-subject scaling tab (you may be able to use this link to open the article)

What is a QTAC Selection Rank?

A QTAC Selection Rank is:

- a number given to a qualification
- on a scale from 1 to 99 (1 being the highest)
- derived from a QTAC or institution specific schedule.

Your school Guidance Officer/Counsellor can show you a schedule that compares OPs with QTAC Selection Ranks. Examples of qualifications that may be allocated a QTAC Selection Rank for a 2019 Year 12 QTAC applicant include:

- OP Ineligible students are allocated a QTAC Selection Rank from results on their Senior Statement when they apply for tertiary courses through QTAC
- Certificates III and IV, Diplomas
- Some Music, dancing and speech and drama qualifications.

These selection ranks will no longer be in use once the ATAR system is introduced in 2020.



Four ideas on how to improve your study outcomes

We all have other things that we would rather be doing than studying, but to be successful and get the results you are aiming for, you will need to put in some hard work. A positive mindset can go along way towards a positive outcome. Some points to think about:

- 1. When you don't get the results you were aiming for thing about what changes you need to make ... you will need to be resilient
- 2. You are not supposed to get the study thing perfect in the beginning. As you move through senior you will get better at studying and remembering your work.
- 3. Ask for assistance when you need it but always look within first to see what you can achieve using your own knowledge, skills and talents
- 4. Never forget to celebrate your successess ... big and small and don't dewll on the thinkg that don't quite go right.

The laws of learning

The following laws of learning and remembering are oldies but goodies.

- Primacy We tend to remember material that is presented first or early in the lesson.
- Recency Work completed most recently is often best remembered.
- Frequency The more often material is presented or revised the more likely it is to be remembered.
- Vividness Material that is presented in interesting, attention-getting ways is more likely to be remembered.
