

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Carers

On Thursday last week, we had the opportunity to celebrate the excellent achievement of our students. We then followed this on Friday with Graduation to farewell our Year 12 graduates. Both days were a highlight of the year - full of joy, excitement and pride. I would like to share excerpts of my address to the students at Awards Ceremony as I think the message is pertinent to all students.



"I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all those who are receiving awards and commend all students for trying their best particularly during this tumultuous year. We come together to celebrate the achievements of our students. We are very proud of you. Today we celebrate excellence or more importantly the pursuit of excellence.

The pursuit of excellence comes from viewing the world through a hope-filled lens. It is future focused, always looking for opportunities to change ourselves and the world around us. Hope-filled thinking is drawn from an understanding that with God all things are possible. Hope-filled thinking gives us the confidence to take courageous risks and persist, knowing that with trust in the Lord and our own capacity then all things are possible.

This is very different to being hopeful. Hopeful thinking is like making a wish. We are all hopeful of winning lotto and I am sure we have all planned our lotto wins. As you know wishing and hoping doesn't get you too many tangible rewards. You are here because you have a tangible reward and your search for excellence starts by using a hope-filled mindset.

I believe that pursuing excellence is being relentless in the search for our own success. I want to be clear that I am encouraging a pursuit for excellence not perfection - they are not the same thing. Consider Christ as our model. Christ called us to have life to the full, to love and serve. This means, seeking to live every day to be the best we can be, to **BE** better and to **DO** better tomorrow than today. Christ did not call us to be perfect. The question is what does the pursuit of excellence look like?

Firstly, create a hope-filled vision that helps you to make big goals, often called big audacious goals. Don't play it safe. Think big, really big, push past the limits of possible then make it happen. Don't settle for something that you can do perfectly, set a goal that is bigger and aim for it even if it's not perfect! Secondly, have the courage to push past the voice of failure. It is often the fear of failure, that makes us play it safe.

What will your big successes be? How amazing are your goals? Are you limiting yourself by worrying about not doing it perfectly? It takes an incredible amount of courage to pursue excellence.

Thirdly, work for it, persist! This takes faith. The old saying goes that faith can move mountains, think about it? What does move mountains – one drop of water - the constant drip, little by little that water changes the rock. It is when we look to the mountain and keep going that we make a difference.

I encourage you as you move into 2021 to draw on the hope, courage and faith of St Stephen to guide you as you pursue excellence in the coming years".



FROM THE PRINCIPAL (CONT)

I know that it is our own grit that helps us stay on the road to excellence, it is a journey that must be littered with attempts. I agree with Simon Sinek who says falling is not failing, it is an important part of the journey and it is in continuing the journey that we succeed. I would also like to share with you my thoughts for the seniors on their graduation.

"It gives me great pleasure to offer a few words of gratitude and advice at this the last time I speak to you. Parents, you have been your child's first teacher, you have been their greatest support, you have nurtured and guided them to adulthood. It has been our privilege and honour to have your children at the college and we offer our sincere thanks for their presence.

To you the graduating class, we are very proud of you and your achievements over the years, you have been successful in a wide range of pursuits from academic to sporting to cultural and community building ventures. The time has come for you to leave the security of St Stephen's and move to the next chapter of your journey - to see all the world has to offer – the excitement, challenges and responsibility. And whilst there is always some sadness at leaving school, it is a with great excitement and celebration after your thirteen years of education. I would like to give you some advice for the next phase of your journey. I have adapted it from JK Rowling's best advice to young people, when she said:

"Personal happiness lies in knowing that life is not a check-list of acquisition or achievement. Your qualifications, your CV, your belongings, your friendships, your Instagram profile are not your life, though you will meet many people who may confuse the two. Life is difficult, and complicated, and beyond anyone's total control, and the humility to know that and the courage to ride with it will enable you to survive life's changing fortunes."

I believe that courage and resilience is your middle name, because as a group, you are the trailblazers, the innovators and the explorers - your resilience and work ethic are to be admired - you have led the way in the new QCE system, homebased learning and the College response to a global pandemic. Courage helps you moderate all that life throws at you. Courage is addressing your fears and feelings, taking responsibility and being accountable for your actions and taking on the struggle. Remember regret is harder to swallow than defeat.

As our seniors embark on the last few days of exams, we bless you and send them on their way...

May God's blessing follow you all as you find new journeys to travel.

May you walk safely along the pathways of your dreams.

May his gentle hand guide the decisions you will make and the passions that you follow

May your hearts and lives always reflect his love and truth,

And may hope be a light within you that you carry into each new day.

Remembering that you have been educated in the light of Jesus and St Stephen – Go make the world a better place – you have all you need to do it. Go light your world!"

In conssidering the pursuit of excellence and the positive impact that our seniors can make in the world, I ask that each one of us spend some time in reflection on how each one of us helps the community as a whole to grow towards excellence each day, and create a world of love and mercy.

May the hope, faith and courage of Christ be with you.





MORE FROM GEORGINA WEISS!

In September, I had the opportunity to go out to Chillagoe with my dad and help CSIRO scientists research autonomous robots. They are taking part in an international competition to design robots that can work and communicate underground without human help. Our job was to help them find the perfect cave for their tests. The CSIRO had brought out three robots (Rat, Kitten and Pumpkin) and lots of drones as well as LIDAR (Light Detection and Ranging equipment) instruments. The robots and the drones were taken into the cave and their mission was to find items that we had placed into the cave (helmets,



ropes, people dummies).

They were not allowed human help and had to communicate amongst each other to explore, map and take 3D scans of the cave within a one hour time limit. It was very exciting to see them in action. The CSIRO is the only non-American robot team in this competition. We helped them get fantastic field experience and data for their next robot development. It was a great experience and it was great to see science in action. Thanks for the days off Miss Manders!

Year 13 Website

<u>Year 13</u> is an online resource for post school options. It provides information on Jobs, Gap Year Programs, Job Vacancies, Studying, Money Advice, Internships and more. The site has a 'Get Advice' section with many articles you might find interesting and informative. Visit the 'Study' section for useful information about industries and occupations.

Tax File Number - Do you have one? You will need one!

Prospective university and TAFE students will need a Tax File Number (TFN) to be able to defer their fee payment through HECS-HELP, FEE-HELP or a VET Student Loan. These loans are made on the basis you pay it back later through the tax system. So, if you do not have a TFN, you will not be able to finalise a government loan for study. There are several ways to apply for a TFN. Visit the <u>Australian Tax Office website</u> for details. You need to apply early as it will take some time to receive your TFN.

Indigenous Commonwealth Scholarships

These scholarships assist Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from low socio-economic backgrounds, particularly those from rural and regional areas. They are administered on behalf of the Commonwealth Government by eligible universities. You will find information about these scholarships in the Scholarships webpage of the institution you have applied to.

Looking For Degrees And Which Institutions Offer Them

<u>Course Seeker</u> is an Australian Government initiative. The interactive website displays course information, entry requirements, and admission processes across Australia. It is particularly helpful if you are thinking of studying interstate. Course Seeker provides access to the full range of higher education study and support options to all students, particularly those experiencing disadvantage, from regional areas and from families with limited historical exposure to the higher education system.


