FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I would like to thank and congratulate all those who were involved in our Anzac Day Ceremony and the local ceremonies. We appreciate the support of our staff, students, parents and community members who made the commemoration special for us.

Anzac Day is a poignant and meaningful opportunity for reflection for so many Australians. We gather 106 years on to honour the endurance, courage, adaptability, and sacrifice before self that shone on the beaches of the Gallipoli. We heard at the assembly that this sense of service and sacrifice continues to live on where our soldiers are involved with conflict around the world.



Our deep connection with the ANZAC tradition is through the legacy passed down from those first ANZACS. This tradition with ideals of mateship, endurance, courage, ingenuity and a larrikin sense of humour; all part of the ANZAC spirit which has contributed to our Australian identity. Each year we consider Anzac Day in the light of these ideals and balance our commemorations with the reality of war with its loss, destruction and trauma. We use the rituals and symbols to reflect. We remember an event that shapes our understanding of the significance of our freedoms. The silence, the bugle call, the stories of sacrifice and acts of service, they all provide us with an outlet for deeply human feelings. Purely and simply, Anzac day prompts us to reflect on what it means to be "of service".

We consider the significance and relevance of this legacy, this call to sacrifice and service, to those of us at St Stephen's, in 2021. The spirit of the Anzac teaches us about sacrifice and service as a deeply sacred act. Courage and selfless acts are reflective of Christ's death and suffering. Sacrifice is the cost of service. Service is the gift of ourselves to another. This Service is the sacrifice we make that allows Christ to come alive through us, for us to be like Christ for others, to be the Christ who walks amongst us in our imperfect world.

At St Stephen's this year we have asked each person to consider "How can I help" in every interaction with others. Asking "How can I help?" is an act of sacrifice – you are asking how can I do something; that will have an impact on me; however large or small; for nothing in return – except to give to another. Nothing, except knowing that your one small act of service will come together with all the other small and large acts of service to make the world a better place. This aligns with the spirit of Anzac. In the Anzac tradition, play your part by asking, "How can I help?"

Ask with courage, with generosity and with hope. It is hope that keeps our spirits up to make great sacrifices and to manage the challenges of our everyday human existence. It is our hope in creating a better world that lifts us to serve. I would like to inspire you with the words of John Curtin, Australian Prime Minister, in 1941 after the bombing of Pearl Harbor and Australian's entry into the war in the Pacific:

"I say, then, to the people of Australia:

Give of your best in the service of this nation. There is a place and part for all of us. Each must take his or her place in the service of the nation, for the nation itself is in peril... Let there be no idle hand. The road of service is ahead. Let us all tread it firmly, victoriously."

For the St Stephen's community, I ask then give of your best in the service of this community, Play your part by asking, "How can I help?" with courage, generosity and hope. As each one of us takes our place to serve others. Let there be no idle hand in helping each other to be the very best they can be and work together to make the world a better place.

Five Year Review

Catholic Education Services, Cairns uses a model of continuous improvement in all schools. This model in the School Effectiveness Framework is a reflective process that has, amongst other practices, an external five yearly review. We are currently preparing for this review which will be conducted by two consultants from the Australian Council for Educational Research on 31 May – 2 June. 

ANZAC DAY AT COLLEGE













ANZAC DAY TRADITION - CAITLIN WADLEY

Year ten student, Caitlin Wadley, was invited to present her speech, written in Canberra in 2019 at the Army Leadership Seminar, at the Dawn Service at the Avenue of Honour Yungaburra. Please see Caitlin's speech below:

The Anzac Day tradition was born on the 25 April in 1915, the day the Australian and NZ troops landed in Gallipoli. The ideals of mateship, endurance and courage shown by those who sacrificed their lives for us were solidified into our national character and are upheld by the youth of today – more than 100 years later.

It began as a day for returned soldiers who sought the comradeship they had experienced in battle and to remember those who did not come home. In the early years the dawn service was for veterans only but as the years went by families and children were encouraged to attend and even participate in Anzac Day ceremonies and so the ceremony become a tradition.

With fewer and fewer veterans marching each year it has fallen to the children of the veterans to march and a new generation of veterans that have served in newer conflicts that have earned our respect and thanks. The youth have watched their parents and grandparents get up for dawn services, march in parades, sit solemnly during the speeches, silences and the Last Post. It is a ritual that is firmly entrenched in most Australian families. We learn about the Anzac tradition in school but it is our parents who convey to us the importance of carrying on the tradition of commemorating Anzac Day. In essence, we do as our parents have done. We value what our parents value. It is an important day for my parents and grandparents and so it is important to me.

I march with my school each Anzac Day, not because of any school requirement, but because it is what I have always done. I wear my father's medals proudly and march with my sister. I've laid a wreath at the tomb of the unknown soldier and I've placed a poppy beside my Great Grandfather's name at the Australian War Memorial.

Today it is often the children and grandchildren who are bringing their elderly parents and grandparents to the marches. We are keeping the tradition alive and that's how we commemorate Anzac Day.

My great grandfather was killed in the Battle of Passchendaele in the year 1917 and his body was never found. My grandparents and my parents have travelled to Ypres in France where his name is engraved on the Menin Gate Bridge and they stood under the bridge as the traffic is stopped at 8pm every night and the last post is

played to honour the men who died there all those years ago. I imagine that I too, will one day stand under that bridge and hear that sorrowful tune and remember him.

We are keeping alive those traditions that have been forged by our parents and theirs before them – but not because we are told to – but because through our participation we come to understand the importance of never forgetting. How we commemorate their memories must mean something to us. And after years of observing my family commemorate this day and my own participation in Anzac Day services I can say that I feel the value of this day. I will endeavour to never let their sacrifices die with me.



GRIEVANCES AND COMPLAINTS

Got a COMPLAINT or GRIEVANCE?



HERE'S HOW TO RESOLVE IT

- 1. Seek to talk it over with the person or persons concerned. Be respectful, positive and constructive try and see the other person's perspective.
- If that doesn't work ask to speak to the school Principal or the person's manager. See if their assistance can help resolve the matter.
- 3. Still no resolution? You can lodge a formal grievance/complaint. To begin the formal process call the Diocesan Professional Standards Unit on 4050 9705. Note that in a small number of cases the matter might be so serious or sensitive that the first two steps are dispensed with and direct contact with the Professional Standards Unit is warranted.
- 4. You will be asked to make your complaint/grievance in writing. Your statement should contain:
 - Your contact details
 - Nature of the matter including the details of the particular allegations (what is the problem, who is involved, when it happened, where it happened, any contextual information, names of witnesses or confidents). This is best provided in numbered paragraphs

- Resolution that is sought (for example an apology or an assurance that certain behaviour will not be repeated)
- 5. Your complaint/grievance will then be referred to a senior Catholic Education Services staff member to manage. In certain circumstances an external person may be appointed to manage the process. They will keep you and the person(s) who is/are the subject of the complaint informed about the progress of the process.
- 6. The person managing the process will:
 - Review all relevant material/evidence
 - Make further enquiries if necessary
 - Assess whether the findings reflect the evidence
 - Make a determination and advise the parties of the decision and the reasons
 - Determine what further action (if any) is
- Not happy with the outcome? You have a right of appeal within 30 days to the Catholic Education Services Executive Director.

Remember:

- You always have recourse through the legal process.
- All parties have a right to expect strict confidentiality in the management of grievance and complaint processes.
- If the matter relates to the commission of a crime, you should report the matter to the **Police**.
- If the matter involves child abuse or reportable conduct there are processes outlined in the Student Protection Manual.
- There are also separate policies on sexual harassment, bullying and discrimination.

Our process for resolving complaints and grievances does not replace, alter or limit your access to legal or police processes or the processes outlined in the documents above.

Policy statement:

Catholic Education in the Diocese of Cairns is committed to developing an educational and organizational culture based on mutual trust and respect. We are committed to providing a safe and supportive work and learning environment for all employees and students.

We acknowledge that employees, students and parents may sometimes have a complaint about a decision, behaviour, act or omission that they feel is unacceptable. While most issues can be resolved through direct discussion between the parties concerned, there may be instances in which this is not possible. This is one of a series of three posters to provide guidance on a process for grievance resolution.

PATHWAYS WITH MR MACCALLUM

TRY-A-TRADE DAY 2021 – Atherton Hospital Construction Site

Six year ten students enjoyed the opportunity to attend the annual Community Skills Queensland (CSQ) Try-A-Trade Day. This year, the day was held at the Atherton Hospital construction site. Students reported having a great day with some fantastic opportunities. We are grateful for these events as they allow young people to carefully consider possible career pathways.



WORK EXPERIENCE - YEAR 10: I note with positivity that year ten students are starting to ask about undertaking work experience. Completing a formal work experience placement is

considered a valuable experience when making decisions related to both subject and career pathways. For year ten students, work experience should be planned for the week of 28th June - 2nd July (first week of school holidays). I encourage students and parents to be looking for and organising placements now as some workplaces fill fast. The first step for students wishing to undertake work experience is to collect a blue Work Experience form from Mrs Bale at Student Services or from me at the S Block Pathways office. I am happy to assist students and parents with work experience placements if needed - please do not hesitate to make contact with me.

WHAT IS A BLUE CARD AND DO I NEED ONE? You need a blue card if you are paid for your work or are a student enrolled in a tertiary course (including certificate, TAFE and university courses) and need to do a practical placement. Students studying a VET (Vocational Education and Training) course such as Certificate III or Diploma, in which they are required to do a work placement involving young people (under 18 years of age) are required, by law, to have a Blue Card. The Blue Card system in Queensland is used to monitor those who work with young people. Its aim is to reduce the risks of harm to young people by creating a safe and non-threatening environment. You can read more about Blue Cards on the Blue Card Services website.

ADF GAP YEAR - APPLY NOW: Students in year twelve can apply now for the 2022 Australian Defence Force (ADF) Gap Year, to experience life in the Navy, Army or Air Force. It is an opportunity to experience military life, without committing to a longer period - 'signing up'. An ADF Gap Year is a way to have an adventurous year, gain valuable skills and work experience and get paid for it. Currently there are 19 roles to choose from for your 2022 Gap year experience including administration, cabin crew, artillery operator, driver, engineer and more. Be aware that it is a very popular program and once all roles are filled the program will close. Search for Gap Year at www.defencejobs.gov.au to find out how to apply. You must be an Australian citizen, aged between 18 and 24 years on admission and have completed year twelve (required passes vary by job).

YEAR 12 STUDENT DISCUSSIONS: Over the coming weeks, all students in year twelve are being given the opportunity to meet with me or Mr Vaughan to continue discussions around their pathway plans for 2022. Eligible ATAR students are being organized first to check that careful consideration is being given to university courses and QTAC applications. Meeting times are being planned by Mrs Bale and Mrs Rantucci and provided to students via a booking slip.

Post-cycle review of new QCE system processes

Purpose

To inform teachers and schools about the post-cycle review of new QCE system processes.

Background

The QCAA is conducting a post-cycle review of the new QCE system's processes and procedures. This activity is aimed at seeking informed feedback so that some immediate improvements can be made to the new system's processes in advance of a formal evaluation to be conducted by independent experts.

The review is well underway. All schools were invited to submit whole-of-school feedback by the end of Term 1, and teachers who performed key roles in endorsement, confirmation, external assessment, and access arrangements and reasonable adjustments (AARA) were invited to participate in a series of focus groups held in March.

QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT: NEXT STEP






